
# Nuneaton & Bedworth Equality & Diversity Profile March 2011



The data cover people allocated a NINo for all types of work and whatever the length of stay in the UK. The NINo data does not show when overseas nationals subsequently depart the UK, nor show length of stay in the UK. The figures therefore give a measure of inflow of overseas nationals registering for a NINo, but do not measure outflow or overall stock of overseas nationals in the UK.

The Index of Multiple Deprivation 2010 (IMD 2010) is a Lower layer Super Output Area (LSOA) measure of multiple deprivation. The IMD is made up of seven LSOA level domain indices, each of which measures a different aspect of deprivation (income, employment, health, education & skills, barriers to housing & services, crime and living environment.) There are also two supplementary indices (Income Deprivation Affecting Children and Income Deprivation Affecting Older People).

There are 32,482 SOAs in England and 333 SOAs in Warwickshire. A LSOA is a unit of geography for the dissemination of statistics. Typically there it contains 1000-2000 people. Each SOA is ranked according to its relative level of deprivation based upon a score generated from a number of different indicators. Low ranks denote greater levels of relative deprivation. A ranking of 1 represents the most deprived SOA nationally and a ranking of 32,482 represents the least deprived SOA nationally. The areas are ranked either within the top 10,20 or 30% most deprived nationally.

## Socio-demographic classification

Mosaic is a classification that groups citizens in terms of their socio-demographics, lifestyles, culture and behaviour to provide a comprehensive view of citizens and their needs. Mosaic can also provide an indication of the degree of diversity across an area.

## Summary & Key Issues:

#### Age and Sex

Nuneaton and Bedworth has a population profile broadly in line with the county and national average. As in other districts and boroughs, men make up a greater proportion of the pensionable population.

The population pyramid for Nuneaton and Bedworth indicates that the younger working age population is under represented compared to the national average whilst older working age people are slighly over represented.

#### Ethnicity

After the white British community (90%), the largest other ethnic groups are Indian (3.5%) and other white (1.7%). Using broad ethnic group categories, the Asian community is the next largest ethnic group. The Asian community in Nuneaton and Bedworth is higher than the average for the county.

Almost a third of national insurance number registrations in Nuneaton and Bedworth were made to individuals from Poland. The next largest allocations were made to people from India and Nepal.

#### Religion

After Christianity, the Muslim and Sikh religion was the most common religions stated at the 2001 census. These communities equate is approximately 1900 and 1800 people respectively in Nuneaton and Bedworth. Around 19% of people at the 2001 census did not state their relig

#### Disability and Health

A slightly higher proportion of people claim Disability Living Allowance (DLA) in Nuneaton and Bedworth compared to the county average. As elswhere in the county, the claimant rate for under-16 males is markedly higher than for the same aged females.

Claimant rates in some parts of the borough are twice the rate of the county average. The LSOAs of Poplar Coalpit Field, Bar Pool North & Crescents and Abbey Town Centre have the highest claimant rates in the borough.

The health domain of the index of multiple deprivation provides another measure or indicator of where health outcomes are likely to be poorest. Seven LSOAs feature in the 10% most health deprived nationally. Nuneaton and Bedworth has the largest number of LSOAs in the 30% most health deprived nationally of any borough or district in the county.

#### Other Measures of Inequality

In Nuneaton & Bedworth the number of 15-18yr olds who are not in education or training (NEET) is above the county average. The LSOAs with the highest rates are Middlemarch & Swimming Pool, Camp Hill West & Quarry and Kingswood Grove Farm & Rural.

#### Free School Meals

Nuneaton and Bedworth has a higher proportion of children/young people claiming free school meals than the Warwickshire average.

#### Notes:

Lower-layer Super-Output Areas (LSOAs) have been used as the primary geographical building block to aggregate data to locality level. LSOAs are the smallest geography for which we have reliable data but in a small number of cases, the boundaries of the localities split an individual LSOA. Where this occurred, data has been apportioned based upon the location of residential households using a combination of Mosaic, 2001 Census and mid-year population estimate data.

The education data used here only takes account of those children that live in Warwickshire and attend Warwickshire County Council maintained schools. It does not include those living outside the County who travel in to attend our schools. Furthermore, the full dataset only represents those children attending Local Authority maintained schools and not the full child population in Warwickshire as we do not collect data from Independent (private) schools or individual pupil data from private residential special/hospital schools or of children that are home educated.
