
Briefing Note - Warwickshire's population


The 2018 mid-year estimates suggest Warwickshire is now home to **571,010** people...



increasing by **6,448** people or **1.1%** from the previous year. One **quarter** of residents live in **Warwick District**



Approximately **39%** of Warwickshire residents are aged between **30-59 years old**. The median age of a Warwickshire resident is **43.1 years**






Around **20%** of Warwickshire residents are **young people** (aged between 0-17)


Around **59%** of Warwickshire residents are of **working age** (aged between 18-64)





Around **21%** of Warwickshire residents are **older people** (aged 65+). Almost 6% are aged 80+





Summary

The revised mid-year estimates refer to the population on 30 June of the reference year and are published annually. They are the official set of population estimates for the UK and its constituent countries, the regions and counties of England, and local authorities and their equivalents.

These are the official revised population estimates for the UK as at 30 June 2018 and therefore reflect the size of the UK population two years on from the EU referendum (23 June 2016). They are based on the Census and are updated annually to account for population change during the period from 1 July to 30 June.

Mid-year population estimates relate to the usually resident population. They account for long-term international migrants (people who change their country of usual residence for a period of 12 months or more) but do not account for short-term migrants (people who come to or leave the country for a period of less than 12 months).

The mid-year population estimates are used directly as a base for other secondary population statistics, such as population projections, population estimates of the very old and population estimates for small geographical areas.

The mid-year population estimates are an important input for a wide number of economic and social statistics. Main users include central and local government and the health sector, where they are used for planning and monitoring service delivery, resource allocation and managing the economy as well as being of interest to the general public.

Key Facts – United Kingdom

- The population of the United Kingdom in mid-2018 was estimated to be 66,435,550, an increase of 395,231 people since mid-2017.
- The UK population grew by 0.6% between mid-2017 and mid-2018, the same rate of growth as in the previous year the slowest since mid-2004.
- There were fewer births (-2%) and more deaths (+3%) than in the previous year. Natural change (births minus deaths) was at its lowest since 2004.
- Net international migration in the year to mid-2018 was 275,000, which was 6,000 higher than the average for the past five years and 45,000 higher than last year.
- In the 12 months to mid-2018, the four local authorities with the fastest-growing populations were all in central London (City of London, Westminster, Camden and Tower Hamlets); the relatively high level of population growth in these areas is partly a reflection of the increase in net international migration between mid-2017 and mid-2018.
