

## Warwickshire Closing the Gap

## Project Update December 2015

The Closing the Gap project was established in January 2015 in response to the challenge of closing the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers. There are seven work streams which are: Pupil Premium Peer Reviews, Governance, Free School Meal claiming and Priority Families, Looked After Children, Achievement for All, Early Years Foundation Stage and transitions, Warwickshire University. The project is ensuring there is synergy across all these activities within the Council which in turn will help address the attainment and achievement gap of disadvantaged children and young people in Warwickshire.

Warwick University Action Research - Ian Abbott	Research has been commissioned with fieldwork commencing September 2015 for completion by January 2016, 5 secondary schools and 10 primary schools will be involved. The research seeks to identify the most effective strategies employed by schools to raise the attainment levels and close the gap in attainment of disadvantaged children. The aims of the research are: to assess the most effective strategies delivered by schools; to provide data on school improvement and the practice of school leadership in schools that have developed effective strategies; to understand/explain the variation in impact of the same/similar strategies in different contexts ie identify the way in which the culture of a school impacts positively on successfully addressing the disadvantage performance gap.	<ul> <li>Early findings presentation at conference on 1<sup>st</sup> December. LAC – Steve Pendleton	From January 15 two dedicated careers advisers for LAC were recruited by RightStep funded by the Virtual School. Early analysis suggests the interventions are having a positive impact. The LAS Pupil Premium policy is being refined; a more rigorous quality assurance process has been introduced in the Personal Education Plans (PEPs); training is being provided by EPs on attachment and trauma. EY team are offering training and support to primary schools to support their LAC children.	The Virtual School has been reorganised with a new team structure and job descriptions. The new core purpose is to "Close the attainment gap between Looked After Children and their peers". A new electronic PEP (ePEP) has been introduced and is being embedded. Pupil Premium payments will be withheld until LAC have an ePEP. Over 150 designated teachers were trained on the new expectations with respect to LAC. Governance – Vince Quayle	Presentations raising the profile of Closing the gap were made to the patch meetings in March. A new Governors course has been developed which includes sources of data, data analysis, what governors should be asking about pupil premium etc. The course has been available to schools subscribing to governor services and was available, 6 delegates attended the first course in April, next course in November currently has 7 delegates. A review of school websites has commenced, PP information has been found to be variable, particularly PP impact information. An audit tool has been developed setting out essential requirements and recommended information that schools should include on their webpages. Secondary Peer Reviews – Jane Spilsbury	6 secondary schools participated in peer reviews that took place between February and June 2015. The reviews were conducted with one of the headteachers from the participating schools and Richard Sutton (Education Adviser and Lead Ofsted Inspector). The reviews were conducted following the methodology developed by the Teaching Schools Alliance and is the same as that used by NLEs when schools are required by Ofsted to put in place an external review of the pupil premium. A summary report highlighting the strengths and key learning points from the	Richard Sutton gave a presentation the Closing the Gap conference summarising strengths and weaknesses across the schools in the project. Richard has undertaken follow up visits with each of the secondary schools this term to establish progress each of the 6 original schools have made since their review. In general, Richard senses that schools have really 'tightened up', funding is more transparent as are expected outputs and governors understand their role better. Primary Peer Reviews – Jane Spilsbury	10 primary and 1 secondary school are taking part in primary peer reviews which are scheduled between September and December 15. The process will follow the same as used in the secondary reviews. All schools taking part in the peer reviews volunteered to take part, many have recently been inspected and want to address their PP gap, others are expecting to be inspected and want to prepare for it. Free School Meals – Bill Basra,	Up to August 15 the project has worked with 8 schools in the north of Warwickshire leading to take up of 58 FSM claims generating £62,625 of pupil premium funding. The project is ongoing in the north and will shortly be starting in Rugby. The FSM project has met positively with District and Borough Revenues and Benefits to discuss automated FSM registration.	Since the Project commenced in April 2014, the Project has secured £83,000 of Pupil Premium and £269,000 that families were entitled to but not claiming. Campaigns have concluded in the South and are currently active in North Warwickshire, Nuneaton and Bedworth. 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Family Learning – Jan Lennon	FL article was published in the September 2015 'Headlines' newsletter for school leaders in Warwickshire which has prompted some contact from schools. FL to be offered to 7 primary schools where gap is large, cohort of disadvantaged pupils was above 5 and the school has expressed some previous interest in FL activity. FL lead to meet jointly with LIOs at schools autumn visit. Schools will be offered FL programmes to disadvantaged families with children in year 5 and year 6. The courses will include: speech, language and communication development; parental engagement in learning; leadership development; child wellbeing-self regulation and attachment.
