Message from the Co-Chairs of SACRE

This has been an eventful year, culminating in the challenges of the global health crisis. Despite these challenges, excitement and productivity have been the keen actions for Warwickshire SACRE, and we tried to capture this in our detailed and accurate Annual Report.

Our faith communities have risen to the challenge

- of hosting interesting and age appropriate visits for schools
- working together to share artistic aspects of the faiths as part of the city of culture
- created a group called the Sacred Space Initiative to develop the area in Coventry referred to the 'Religious Square Mile.'
- continuing to provide support for their communities (and each other) when we all had to move "online"

We have been privileged to continue our unique partnership with Coventry SACRE, sharing experiences, ideas and support structures such as the SACRE website, joint meetings and Agreed Syllabus. This has only been possible because the two Local Authorities share the vision and commitment to work together on behalf of the schools and children in their area. The result is that we have been able to continue our combined efforts, resources and encouragement, leading to levels of service and support for schools that could only be dreamed of by the Local Authority acting alone.

Our amazing RE Facilitator, Jennifer Jenkins, who manages to inspire and guide both SACREs and schools on a remarkably small allocation of time. She is supported in this by Lucy Lambert and Juliet Silverton from Coventry LA, Jane Bennett and Sarah Tregaskis from Warwickshire LA and the Education Team from Coventry Cathedral. To all these people, Coventry SACRE extends its heartfelt thanks.

Juliet and Sarah have now moved on, we wish them good luck and look forward to working with Rachel Sugars and Kim Garcia in the 2020/2021 year.

Our thanks go to the Sikh and Islamic communities for their support in producing digital materials for use as part of a school based INSET programme. We look forward to completing this segment in Birmingham synagogue as soon we become 'Covid free'.

We moved to meeting virtually in Summer. Many of us have become technology literate!

Group A from both SACREs met with the Dean of Coventry Cathedral to discuss the impact of Covid on our faith communities and ourselves. Faith group relationships have deepened to include co-ordinating activities such as providing food, helping vulnerable members of the community stay connected and many more. We have worked with Public Health England to ensure government messages are understood and supported by our faith communities. We are taking care of each other.

The result of this ongoing co-operation is that SACRE has not only been able to meet its statutory commitments but managed to work on producing resources for schools and support the events and initiatives of religious communities across the city. Examples include the CPD sessions to support the delivery of the Agreed Syllabus, videos linked to festivals in April; the regular RE Bulletin to schools, the films being made as a result of a successful grant application to the Westhill Trust, school assemblies, monitoring and support visits to schools, , the Lord Mayor's Peace Poetry Competition, taking part in the Bridge project and hosting a virtual Peace Walk. Further details of these events and initiatives are to be found within the Report, although the words on paper only faintly bear witness to the events themselves.

Finally, we thank all the members of SACRE for their attendance, ideas, support, flexibility and forbearance as they represent their respective faiths and bodies, as we learn and journey together. These words cannot fully reflect the buzz and community interaction that has happened over the year – even if some of the interaction has been virtual.

1. SACREs role and function

SACRE has a statutory duty:

- To advise the Local Authority on collective worship and Religious Education in community schools and foundation schools which do not have a religious character. Religious Education in these schools must be delivered in accordance with an Agreed Syllabus.
- To advise the Local Authority on collective worship and methods of teaching, choice of materials and teacher training in Religious Education and collective worship.
- To provide an annual report.
- To require Warwickshire County Council to periodically review the locally Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education (at least every 5 years).

In addition the SACRE can:

- Consider applications made by a Headteacher to release some or all of the pupils in a particular school from the requirement for collective worship to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character (a Determination).

Membership of SACRE:

Warwickshire SACRE comprises four statutory groups:

- Group A – Christian Denominations and other religions that appropriately reflect the principal religious traditions of the area. Currently Warwickshire SACRE has provision for representatives from the following faiths – Baha'i, Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Christianity (Free Churches), Roman Catholicism, and Sikhism.
- Group B – Church of England (Christianity)
- Group C – Teacher Associations
- Group D – Warwickshire County Council (Elected members)

Additional members including people with particular expertise in areas of religious education or who represent perspectives not included in the statutory groups are co-opted by SACRE.

In 2019/20 Warwickshire SACRE had co-opted members representing:

- Humanists UK (previously British Humanist Association)
- The Church of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon)
- Polish Catholic Mission

Membership details are shown in Appendix A.

2. Advice provided by SACRE

a) Advice to Local Authority

SACRE continues to support the Local Authority in seconding a RE specialist in the form of an RE Facilitator to provide support to Warwickshire schools and Warwickshire SACRE.

Warwickshire SACRE also continued joint-working with Coventry through the merging of the two Chairs Groups.

The RE Facilitator updated SACRE on national developments in RE, including a move towards a more multi-disciplinary approach.

SACRE also advised the local authority on contacting schools who did not appear to be fulfilling legal requirements for RE provision or who were entering no or low pupil numbers for exams in RE.

b) Schools

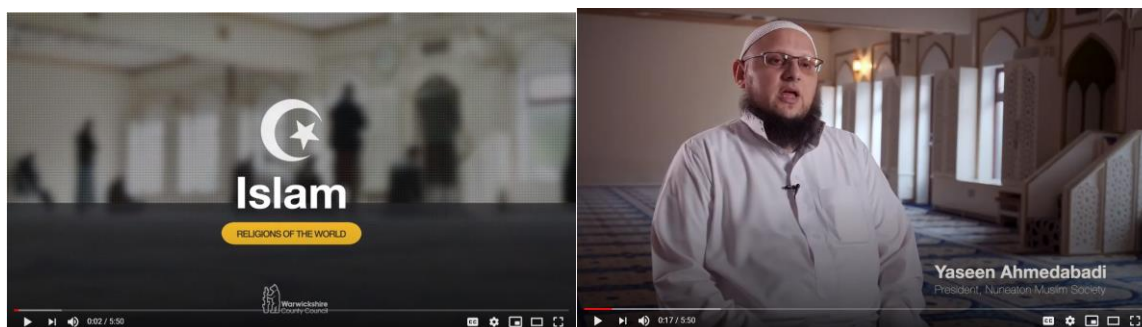

Primary Peace and Reconciliation Complimentary Units with resources were written in conjunction with Coventry Cathedral, so that schools can bring a local flavour to their implementation of the Agreed Syllabus. Our RE Facilitator also wrote an article on the local peace and reconciliation flavour of RE in the January 2020 edition of RE Today Magazine.

An Inter Faith Trail for Schools was shared via our SACRE website and schools were encouraged to mark Inter Faith Week.

The Warwickshire RE Subject Leaders network meetings were registered as a NATRE group to aid promotion of local twilights and networking and to receive additional resources and access to funding.

Individual schools were supported in developing RE policies and a model RE policy was created.

Individual schools were supported in developing LTP/Curriculum plans for RE and in devising their own progression documents to match their RE curriculum.

SACRE members created video/presentation resources during the Coronavirus Pandemic based on the festivals they were celebrating at home. Some feedback from schools: *"This is fantastic and falls right in line with what we are delivering at the moment!"* Feedback from local NATRE RE Ambassador for the West Midlands, Chris Giles: "Your SACRE is incredible, a real role model to others" (During #REChatUK on Twitter).

A request was made for progression documents and the school was supported in developing their own by the RE Facilitator.

RE Pedagogies CPD was written for RE teachers to support their ongoing leaning during the Coronavirus Pandemic.

SACRE's support was requested in promoting the Lord Mayor's Peace Poem Competition and this was made available to Warwickshire schools for the first time, alongside Coventry schools already engaging with the annual competition.

SACRE facilitated visits by faith visitors for three schools, arranging for a Hindu Visitor and a Jewish Visitor to support learning in RE.

A monitoring visit was made to a primary school in Warwickshire and advice was given on developing the RE curriculum, as well as observation of some RE lessons, looking at books and speaking with pupils.

Support for new RE subject leaders was through a session specifically for those new to leading the subject, and, where needed, a mentoring partnership was established with established RE subject leaders.

Support with RE subject leader action planning was the theme for the Autumn term's CPD session, so that RE subject leaders could respond to the new requirements of the revised Ofsted framework.

3. Standards and Quality of Provision of RE

a) Public examinations

Please note: *The 2020 examination results are not yet available, they are due to be published at the end of January 2021. The data below is from examinations taken in summer 2019.*

b) Quality of RE provision in schools

Ofsted visits to Warwickshire schools in 2019-20 were as follows:

Nursery/Early Years 2 inspections
 Primary Schools 28 inspections (plus 3 monitoring visits)
 Secondary schools 7 inspections (plus 1 monitoring visit)
 Special schools 0 inspections

Typically comments made about RE, SMSC and Collective Worship were very positive, with only 2 comments made in secondary Ofsted reports indicating RE and RE required some development. These have formed actions for SACRE in 2020-21.

c) Withdrawal

SACRE is not aware of any withdrawals from RE made during 2019-20.

d) Complaints

No formal complaints were received by SACRE regarding RE or collective worship in 2019-20.

4. Agreed Syllabus

The main priorities for Coventry SACRE in 2019/20 were:

- Subject knowledge of our teachers (Westhill Grant project)
- Working in partnership with our faith groups
- Raising the profile of interfaith partnership through:
 - a) Creating resources
 - b) Supporting with visits and visitors
 - c) Sharing faith group events for representatives to attend

1) RE Bulletins were sent out at the beginning of each term, informing teachers of local and national RE developments, new resources to support the implementation of the Agreed Syllabus and CPD opportunities to support development of subject knowledge and pedagogy for teaching RE effectively, as well as mid-term updates on online learning resources and free CPD during the lockdown.

2) Several CPD events were put on for teachers and RE leads, including one in July 2020 on Microsoft Teams that focused on RE for Well Being to support schools with their planning for 'recovery curriculum' in the Autumn Term (see the full list below). This made links with the Agreed Syllabus and featured selected stories, prayers and practices from SACRE members from different faith traditions.

3) The Westhill RE Subject Knowledge programme was launched in November 2019 with a successful grant bid from Warwickshire SACRE. Two out of three sessions (Sikhism and Islam) were completed before the Coronavirus Pandemic interrupted the scheduled programme. Coventry SACRE will continue the project in 2020-21. For more details see Section 2 and the link to the Warwickshire SACRE website.

4) During 2019-20 SACRE created 'Do and Don't' documents for each main religious tradition, plus Humanism. These were made in consultation with SACRE representatives and are available to all teachers in both Coventry and Warwickshire via the Warwickshire SACRE website. These are popular documents, alongside our SACRE-Suggested Visits and Visitors List.

5) SACRE supported Coventry Cathedral in putting on a training session for teaching pupils about Pentecost in February 2020.

6) Videos to explain how different faith communities were celebrating their festivals (featured in the Agreed Syllabus) during lockdown were shared with teachers to support them in showing pupils the breadth, diversity and dynamic nature of religions during this time. These were used for in-class learning for those pupils in school and home learning for pupils learning remotely.

7) Individual requests made to the RE Facilitator in 2019-20 were followed up with resources or a visit offered and comments made on evaluation forms were also followed up via email and the sharing of links and resources.

8) Places of worship around the city, well represented by members of SACRE, continued to welcome pupils for educational visits until Covid-19 meant all visits were suspended.

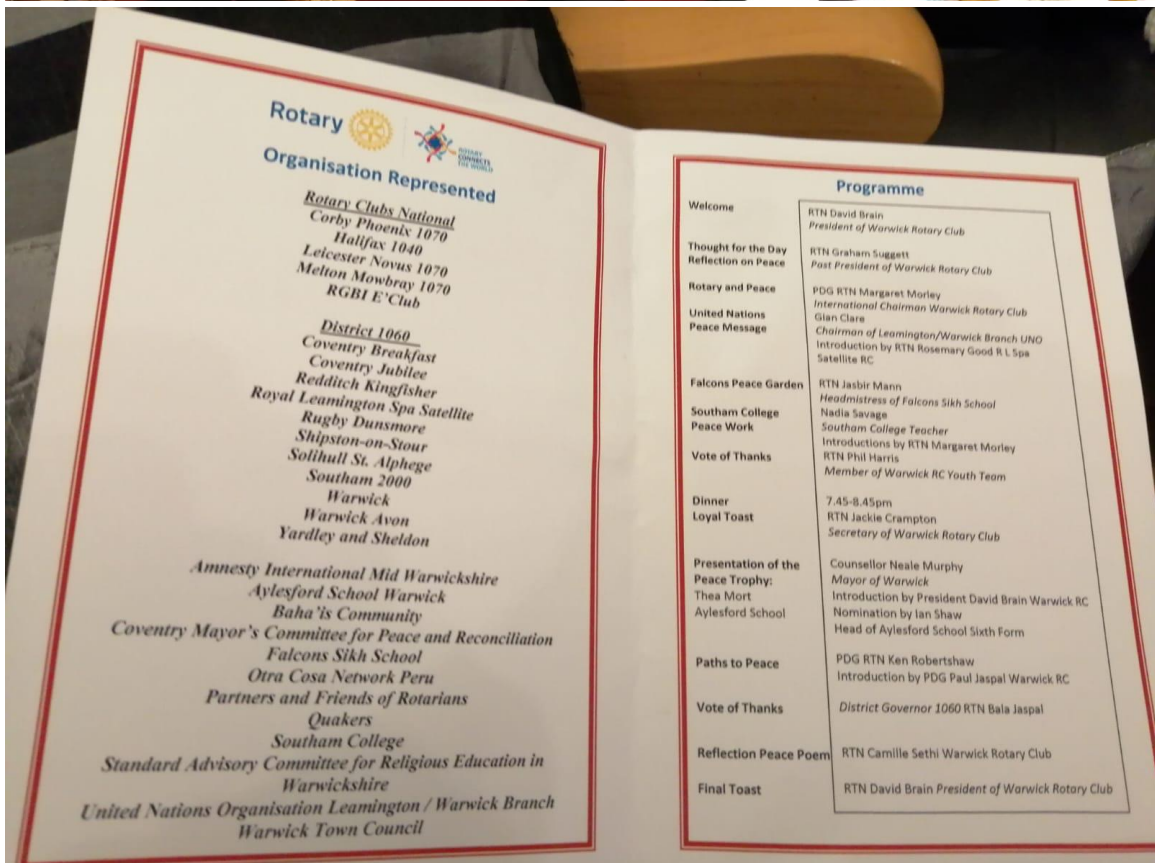

5. Collective Worship

6. Management of SACRE

a) Attendance at SACRE Meetings

SACRE has continued to select meeting in venues which reflect its three key partnerships; schools, faith groups and the Local Authority. Where a meeting is held in a school, there is usually an opportunity for SACRE members to have a look at the RE work on display and to learn about the delivery of the RE curriculum across the school. This is also the case with meetings held at places of worship, where members of the faith community will provide an insight into their particular faith or belief through a short presentation to members and/or tour of the building.

b) Membership and training

There were several vacancies in Group C. Renewing the constitution and membership will be a priority for SACRE in 2019/20.

In January 2020, members of SACRE attended a session with input from West Midlands NATRE Ambassador, Chris Giles, as well as Jen Davis from the RSC with regards to a faith project.

c) Professional and Financial Support

A budget is provided to SACRE by the County Council. SACRE has advised the local authority on priorities and how this funding should be spent. In 2019-20, this was used to fund the following:

- Supporting the delivery of the Agreed Syllabus including:
 - Monitoring delivery of the Agreed Syllabus in schools
 - Training for local RE teachers, including venue, hospitality and printing costs
 - Salary for RE Facilitator one day a week during term time, plus expenses (mileage and resources)
- Servicing of SACRE meetings – venues, refreshments
- NASACRE annual subscription / attendance at AGM
- NATRE annual subscription
- CPD for RE Facilitator

The local authority has continued to provide support to SACRE with LA Officer time, a clerk and other administrative staff in order to enable SACRE to fulfil its duties.

7. Contribution of SACRE to the wider Local Authority agenda

a) SACRE contributions to LA agenda and other agendas

The main priority for SACRE in 2019/20 were:

- Subject knowledge of our teachers (Westhill Grant project)
- Working in partnership with our faith groups
- Raising the profile of interfaith partnership through:
 - a) Creating resources
 - b) Supporting with visits and visitors
 - c) Sharing faith group events for representatives to attend

1) Role of RE Facilitator

Warwickshire SACRE continue to support the local authority in seconding a RE Specialist Facilitator to provide support to Warwickshire schools and SACRE. This is a joint appointment with Coventry SACRE and has proved very successful, with evaluations of training sessions run in 2019-20 as follows:

The RE Facilitator is in regular contact with the Local Authority officers to ensure support offered to school is appropriate in terms of content and timing. Schools can request an RE monitoring visit. This may be the case in response to comments made on an Ofsted inspection report or SIAMS inspection report, in preparation for a pending inspection or simply because RE is on the school's development plan. In 2019-20 2 Warwickshire primary schools requested RE monitoring visits.

2) Westhill Subject knowledge Enhancement Project

In November 2019 Warwickshire SACRE began an excellent Westhill project focused on developing RE subject leaders' subject knowledge, and Coventry SACRE was successful in May 2020 to continue the second part of the project begun by Warwickshire SACRE. Coventry SACRE are due to begin their sessions in 2020-21, though the last session for Warwickshire is still to be

completed due to the Coronavirus Pandemic and the start of Coventry SACRE's leg of the project is now delayed until further notice.

Use of our Westhill videos was requested by Coventry Safeguarding Team and these resources are now being more widely used. A Coventry councillor also made a request to use the Do and Don't docs with councillors, which SACRE granted.

3) Support for other RE Agencies/Organisations

SACRE supported the development of a Scriptural Reasoning project by the Faith and Belief Forum through the input of the RE Facilitator.

The RE Facilitator was asked to provide mentoring for those doing the Pilot RE Leadership Programme run by Culham (RE Facilitator is mentoring one tutee in 2020-21).

The RE Facilitator's work on Theologies of Reading was requested by RE Online and is now part of their online collection of resources:

4) Joint working – Coventry and Warwickshire SACREs

Warwickshire SACRE has continued conversations with Coventry SACRE around joint working and partnership working between Warwickshire and Coventry SACRE has continued during 2019-20. In 2017/18 it was agreed to merge the two Chairs' Consultative Groups and this continued in 2019/20. There continues to be overlap in the membership with the two SACREs, sharing a co-chair and a number of representatives in Group A and Group B and the agreed syllabus for both Coventry and Warwickshire schools. The appointment of the RE Facilitator continued as a joint appointment during 2019-20, so that schools covered by both SACREs receive training for teachers and RE subject leaders and support in developing RE provision.

b) SACRE support to schools (events and training)

Appendix C

Here are some examples of RE comments made on Ofsted reports on Warwickshire schools in 2019-20:

Primary

Other subjects, such as art, religious education or French, are less well planned. Teachers use different schemes for their planning of the same subjects. This means that some pupils' skills and knowledge are not connected well. Pupils' learning is then disjointed- **This is being followed up by SACRE in 2020-2021**

Parents and pupils value the school's wide range of after-school clubs and off-site visits. These contribute well to pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. The school provides many opportunities for pupils beyond the subjects they study. There are close links with local community. For example, pupils and parents celebrate harvest, Easter and Christmas in the parish church.

They have a growing understanding of different cultures and religions.

Leaders are deeply committed to providing a diverse range of opportunities in order to support pupils' personal development. Over time, they have created an exciting bespoke package to ensure that this happens. The 'Holy Spirit Experience' adds immense richness to the curriculum. It ensures opportunities for every pupil to develop resilience and character, and to acquire a deep cultural capital.

Pupils learn about different cultures, beliefs and religions. They respect each other's views and are happy to share ideas. Pupils learn to be tolerant of others. They enjoy leading prayers in the neighbouring church. Together with a local community veteran, pupils recently commemorated International Remembrance Day. Trips and visiting speakers teach them about life in multi-cultural Britain. This is reinforced in

school activities. For example, pupils who are of the Sikh faith recently enjoyed sharing sweets with their classmates to celebrate the festival of Diwali. Pupils value the wide range of after-school clubs and trips that make their learning more interesting. There is something for everyone. Pupils speak enthusiastically about the eco club and the recent visit to a Hindu temple.

Pupils learn about different artists, know about different world religions, and can say short sentences in French.

Pupils demonstrate high levels of respect for different religions and cultures. They are adamant that anyone is welcome at their school regardless of skin colour, faith or disability.

They carry out different roles sensibly and have a good awareness of different religions and cultures.

Secondary

The personal, social and health education (PSHE) curriculum is well planned and delivered in religious education (RE) lessons and in tutor time. Leaders need to check that the delivery of the RE subject content is not negatively affected by the quantity of PSHE work during these lessons.

Leaders have introduced a new personal development programme. While it is improving the provision, it does not yet sufficiently support pupils' understanding of being a citizen in modern Britain. Leaders should make sure that all pupils gain sufficient knowledge about life in modern Britain. **This is being followed up by SACRE in 2020-2021**
