Fundamental Principle of the Faith What the faith teaches about taking care of the environment (sacred texts)	We believe in God as Creator, who sees his creation as good, Jesus as the 'Second Adam' who reconciled all things to God through his blood shed on the cross, and the Holy Spirit as Sustainer of Life.
Application of the Principle to the Motion of the debate What responsibility the faith tradition's teaching passes to individuals	As people reconciled to God, we need to obey God's call to Adam to care for God's earth, which means love and service expressed through sustainable (you can keep it going) lifestyle and community life, ensuring justice and care for all environmentally vulnerable people and places.
