Executive summary

A survey to collect residents' views on priorities identified for the Levelling Up plan that is being developed for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough was sent to 161 Voice of Warwickshire panel members who live in the borough.

There were 71 responses to the survey, a response rate of 44.1%. Respondents aged 18-39 were underrepresented.

Theme: Growing and Learning

Respondents were presented with three priorities for the growing and learning theme and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough.

- 73.9% (n=51) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to reduce the number of children in care (69 respondents answered this question).
- 85.7% (n=60) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to improve school readiness (70 respondents answered this question).
- 90% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to increase educational attainment and attendance (70 respondents answered this question).
- Respondents were asked if they had any further comments to make about the priorities; 38% (n=27) provided comments. Of these, seven indicated they disagreed or were unsure if reducing the number of children in care should be a target. Four respondents suggested more resources were required to meet the needs, three emphasised that education is important and three commented that parents need to take responsibility. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.
- Respondents were asked what actions they felt needed to be taken to achieve the priorities; 50.7% (n=36) responded to this question. The most common theme mentioned by nine respondents was to get a better understanding of issues and causes related to these priorities. In addition, seven respondents suggested more support for parents and carers is required; six mentioned the need for more school places; six referred to encouraging parents to take more responsibility and five mentioned reviewing social care. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.

Theme: Skills and working

Respondents were shown three priorities for the skills and working theme and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. A total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered these questions.

- 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to increase access to training
- 90% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to increase young people's aspirations

- 87.1% (n=61) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to improve employment support and access to higher paid jobs
- Respondents were asked if they had any further comments to make about the priorities; 36.6% (n=26) provided comments. Of these, six commented that individuals need to want to aspire; four suggested advised more careers support; four suggested involving employers; four mentioned providing encouragement and opportunities and four referred to reasonable pay for jobs. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.
- Respondents were asked what actions they felt needed to be taken to achieve the priorities; 50.7% (n=36) responded to this question. A third of these (12) suggested improved careers advice, training and support were needed; seven advised partnerships with employers and local educational establishments; six referred to apprenticeships and four suggested being more realistic about educational goals for individuals. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.

Theme: health and wellbeing

Respondents were shown three priorities for the health and wellbeing theme and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough.

- 92.6% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to lower the suicide rate (68 respondents answered this question).
- 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to reduce the under 75 mortality rate from respiratory diseases (70 respondents answered this question).
- 87.1% (n=61) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to reduce obesity in adults and children (70 respondents answered this question).
- Respondents were asked if they had any further comments to make on the priorities; 36.6% (n=26) commented. Of these, nine suggested education and improved information on food health; eight suggested improved access to support and education on mental health; four mentioned improved access to health care and four said it is not the local authorities responsibility. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.
- Respondents were asked what actions they felt needed to be taken to achieve the health and wellbeing priorities; 50.7% (n=36) respondents answered this question. Of these, eight advised improved capacity and access to services to support mental health; seven referred to infrastructure and initiatives to encourage healthier lifestyles; seven mentioned improving capacity and access to primary health services; and five suggested improving and maintaining the local area. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.

Theme: safe and strong

Respondents were shown three priorities for the safe and strong theme and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. A total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered these questions.

- 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority of targeting youth offenders
- 90.0% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority to reduce the fear of crime
- 92.8% (n=65) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority to improve community engagement
- Respondents were asked to provide any further comments they had on the safe and strong priorities; 43.7% (n=31) commented. A third of these (n=10) advised proactive and visible policing was needed with nice providing examples of crime and antisocial behaviour in the area. A further six suggested appropriate consequences are required and six suggested addressing causes with support. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.
- Respondents were asked what actions they felt needed to be taken to achieve these priorities; 47.9% (n=34) responded to this question. Just over half (n=18) suggested more police resources are needed; whilst 13 advised more engagement with the community is needed; 11 suggested effective deterrents and seven mentioned activities for younger residents. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.

Places for priority

- Respondents were asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with the 17 areas identified for levelling up in Nuneaton & Bedworth; 97.2% (n=69) answered this question. Just over half (53.6%, n=37) strongly agree or agreed to the areas shown, however, 27.5% (n=19) advised they strongly disagreed or disagreed with the areas.
- Respondents were asked to add any further comments regarding their response and asked to include any other areas they thought should be a priority for Levelling Up in Nuneaton and Bedworth. A total of 42.3% (n=30) responded to this question with 50% (n=15) saying they disagreed and felt all areas should be a priority. Four said they agreed with the areas identified. There were other responses by fewer respondents that mentioned specific areas in the borough.

Making a difference

- Respondents were asked how the councils (Warwickshire County Council and Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough Council) should engage local people on delivering the Levelling Up plan; 63.4% (n=45) of respondents answered this question. Just over half of respondents (n=25) suggested inclusive and proactive engagement, whilst 11 suggested leaflets, newsletter and letters. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.
- Respondents were asked where councils should be engaging to build people's opinions on the Levelling Up plan; 53.8% (n=38) respondents answered this question. Common themes were – local shops and town centres (n=8), use established local groups (n=5), and use community centres and spaces (n=5). A further five suggested tailoring engagement to suit residents.
- The final question within this section asked how in five years respondents would judge if Levelling Up had been successful; 66.2% (n=47) respondents answered this question.

There were numerous suggestions, with 19 respondents suggesting reduced crime and anti-social behaviour; twelve saying thriving town centres; nine referring to improved standards of living; eight mentioning improved and maintained public areas; eight saying evidence of progress or completed projects; and eight saying improved communication, engagement and listening. Other themes were mentioned by fewer respondents.

Further comments

- Respondents were given an opportunity to add any further comments on levelling up in Nuneaton and Bedworth; 28.2% (n=20) of respondents provided comments. Overall six talked about the concept and meaning of Levelling up; six mentioned doing things differently; and five suggested improved communication and engagement.

Background

The Voice of Warwickshire panel (VoW) was launched in October 2021 when residents in Warwickshire were invited to register and join the panel. The panel gives residents aged 18 and over in Warwickshire an opportunity to share their views on the big issues in Warwickshire.

This report summarises the results of a survey sent to 161 Voice of Warwickshire panel members who live in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. This survey was intended to gather panel members' views on priorities identified for the Levelling Up plan that is being developed for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough.

Method

An online survey was hosted on the Citizen Space 'Ask Warwickshire' site. All members of the panel were asked how they would prefer to complete surveys when they initially signed up to join the panel. The majority (>99%) of panel members opted to complete online surveys with five members advising they would prefer to complete paper-based surveys. There was one panel member who requested to complete surveys over the phone. The other panel members were sent an email with a private link to participate in the online survey. Three reminder emails were sent to those who had not completed the survey during the live period. In total, an email with a link to the survey was distributed to 160 members of the Voice of Warwickshire panel.

The survey ran from Wednesday 13th September 2023 to Wednesday 4th October 2023.

Quantitative results have been analysed and open text responses have been themed.

Results

There were 71 responses to the survey: a response rate of 44.1%.

4.1 Respondent Profile

All panel members who responded to the survey live in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. Table 1 shows the characteristics of panel members responding to the survey. Figure 1 shows the middle super output areas (MSOAs) where respondents who answered the survey reside. Higher numbers of responses were from residents living in the MSOAs of Weddington, Whitestone, St Nicholas and Bulkington.

Figure 1: Map showing areas of responses by MSOA



4.2 Theme: Growing and learning

Respondents were shown three priorities for the growing and learning theme and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. The priorities were:

- Reduce the number of children in care
- Improve school readiness
- Increase education attainment and attendance

Just under three-quarters of respondents (73.9%, n=51) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to reduce the number of children in care. A total of 97.2% (n=69) respondents answered this question with the percentage of responses shown in Figure 2.

Figure 2: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the priority “to reduce the number of children in care” (percentage of total responses)





Figure 3 shows that 85.7% (n=60) strongly agreed or agreed with the statement to improve school readiness. A total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered this question.

The next priority asked how strongly the respondents agreed or disagreed with increased educational attainment and attendance. Overall, 90% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with this priority (Figure 4). A total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered this question.

Respondents were asked to provide any comments they had relating to their agreement/disagreement about the priorities in an open text box. A total of 38% (n=27) responded to this question. The answers have been themed and are shown in table 2 below.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included: review attendance policy, benchmark good schools, less focus on academic subjects, review what is meant by school readiness, improved infrastructure, support mental health.

The next question asked respondents to advise what actions they thought needed to be taken to achieve the priorities listed. Just over half of respondents (50.7%, n=36) answered this question. The most common theme mentioned by respondents was to understand the barriers in education.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included: more preschool facilities, improved social cohesion and review attendance policies.

4.3 Theme: Skills and working

The next theme respondents were asked about was skills and working. Respondents were shown three priorities and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough; 98.6% (n=70) respondents gave their views. The priorities were:

- Increase access to training opportunities
- Increase young people's aspirations
- Improve employment support to access higher paid jobs

Nearly all respondents, 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to increase access to training (Figure 5).

Figure 5: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the priority "to increase access to training opportunities" (percentage of total responses)




The majority, 90% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to increase young people's aspirations (Figure 6).

The final priority within this theme asked how strongly respondents agreed or disagreed with the priority to improve employment support and access to higher paid jobs. Overall, 87.1% (n=61) strongly agreed or agreed with this priority (Figure 7).

Respondents were asked to provide any comments they had about the skills and working theme in an open text box. The answers have been themed and are shown in table 4 below. Overall, 36.6% (n=26) respondents answered this question.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included: right people in jobs, infrastructure, understand barriers, look after estates, agree with priorities, look at crime and anti social behaviour.

The next question asked respondents to say what actions they thought needed to be taken to achieve the skills and working theme. A total of 50.7% (n=36) respondents answered this question. The themed responses are shown in Table 5.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included: a politician with vision and to clean up streets.

4.4 Theme: Health and wellbeing

The next theme respondents were asked about was health and wellbeing. Respondents were shown three priorities and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. The priorities were:

- Reduce obesity in adults and children
- Lower the suicide rate
- Reduce the under 75 mortality rate from respiratory diseases

The majority of respondents, 87.1% (n=61), strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to reduce obesity in adults and children, a total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered this question (Figure 8).

Figure 8: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the priority “reduce obesity in adults and children” (percentage of total responses)






Figure 9 shows, 92.6% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority to lower the suicide rate, a total of 95.8% (n=68) respondents answered this question.

The final priority asked if respondents agreed or disagreed with the priority to reduce the under 75 mortality rate from respiratory diseases. The majority of respondents, 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed with the priority; a total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered this question.

Respondents were asked to provide any comments they had relating to their agreement/disagreement about the priorities in the health and wellbeing theme in an open text box. The answers have been themed and are shown in table 6 below. A total of 36.6% (n=26) respondents answered this question.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included access to free and healthy school meals, focus on deprivation, Improve homes, resources for NHS, national issues and police visibility.

4.5 Theme: Safe and strong

The next theme respondents were asked about was safe and strong. Respondents were shown three priorities and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them being a priority for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. The priorities were, target youth offenders; reduce fear of crime; and improve community engagement. A total of 98.6% (n=70) respondents answered the questions.

- 91.4% (n=64) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority of targeting youth offenders (Figure 11)
- 90% (n=63) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority to reduce the fear of crime, (Figure 12)




Figure 13: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the priority “improve community engagement” (percentage of total responses)

- 92.8% (n=65) strongly agreed or agreed to the priority to improve community engagement (Figure 13)

Figure 12: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the priority “reduce the fear of crime” (percentage of total responses)

Respondents were asked to provide any comments they had relating to their agreement/disagreement about the priorities in an open text box. The answers have been themed and are shown in table 8. A total of 43.7% (n=31) respondents provided comments.

The next question asked respondents to advise what actions they thought needed to be taken to achieve the safe and strong priorities. The responses are shown in Table 9. A total of 47.9% (n=34) respondents answered this question. Overall, 52.9% advised more Police resource is needed, as shown in table 9 below.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included support young offenders and parental responsibility.

4.6 Places of priority in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough





Figure 15: Map showing areas identified as priority areas for Levelling Up in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough.

Respondents were asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed that the 17 areas identified and shown on a map (Figure 15) should be priority for Levelling Up in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. Overall, 97.2%(n=69) of respondents answered this question. Just over half of respondents 53.6%, (n=37) strongly agree or agreed with the areas shown being a priority, 27.5% (n=19) strongly disagreed or disagreed (Figure 14).

Figure 14: Responses to how strongly do you agree or disagree with the areas of priority (percentage of total responses)

Respondents were asked to add any further comments regarding their response and asked to include any other areas they thought should be a priority for Levelling Up in Nuneaton and Bedworth. A total of 42.3% (n=30) responded to this question with 50% (n=15) of those who responded saying they disagreed, and that all areas should be a priority.

Themes mentioned by one respondent included unfamiliar with the areas, environment should be a priority, Whitestone, west of Nuneaton, Caldwell and Bulkington.

4.7 Making a difference

Respondents were asked how the council should engage local people on delivering the Levelling Up plan; 63.4% (n=45) of respondents answered this question. Just over half of respondents 55.6%, (n=25) suggested inclusive and proactive engagement.


