Survey 14: Are you prepared for emergencies?

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Executive summary

This survey builds on a survey carried out with Voice of Warwickshire panel members in 2024 and intends to understand how best to support the public in the event of a major emergency or incident. The survey was for current voice of Warwickshire (VOW) panel members and asked about current understanding and knowledge about Warwickshire Resilience Forum (WRF), local incidents that may affect them and where they live, and how prepared they are if such incidents were to occur.

There were 344 responses to the survey, a response rate of 37.8%. Panel members were sent two reminders about completing the survey. Representation from each district and borough was generally in line with the Warwickshire population, but some other demographic groups were underrepresented, specifically young people and some ethnicities.

Warwickshire Resilience Forum

Most respondents (68.9%, n=237) were 'not aware at all' when asked to describe their level of awareness of what Warwickshire Resilience Forum is. Just under a third of respondents (28.2%, n=97) said they were aware of it but didn't know much about it and a small proportion of respondents (2.9%, n=10) said they had a good level of awareness about it. No respondents said they were actively engaged with WRF.

When asked if they recognised the logo for Warwickshire Resilience Forum, the majority of respondents (91.3%, n=314) said 'no'; smaller proportions said they weren't sure (4.4%, n=15), or 'Yes' (4.1%, n=14).

Respondents were then asked what the logo meant to them – as many responses as applicable could be selected. Most respondents (82%, n=282) selected 'It means nothing to me – it doesn't tell me anything'. Just under a tenth (9.3%, n=32) selected 'I can find out information on how to better prepare for an emergency or incident'. Slightly less (8.1%, n=28) selected 'I can find updates on a current emergency or incident', and less than that (7%, n=24) selected 'I can find out information about the risks to my area'. Comments were also provided, from which there were some themes identified, including criticism of the logo, description of the logo, and not being aware of the logo.

Respondents were asked 'Where would you go for information, advice, and guidance in the event of an emergency?' – as many responses as applicable could be selected. The most selected option (n=233, 67.7%) was 'Emergency services (police, fire, ambulance) website', followed by 'News on the TV' (n=224, 65.1%). The least selected option was Instagram, which was selected by 14 respondents. 'Other social media sites' (n=19), 'Warwickshire Resilience Forum website' (n=21), and 'News feed and channels via X/Twitter' (n=25) were also lesser selected options. There were 8 respondents who mentioned in the comments looking online (including utility website, news, and internet searches).

The majority of respondents said yes (94.2%, n=324) to 'Do you use websites to access information?', whilst 4.4% (n=15) said no. Next respondents were asked 'Which social media sites or community networking tools do you use?', with the option to select multiple options. The most selected option was 'WhatsApp' (79.7%, n=274), followed by Facebook (68.3%, n=235). Lesser selected options included Snapchat (2.9%, n=10), Warwickshire Connected (6.4%, n=22), and TikTok (6.7%, n=23). There were 15 respondents who said in the comments that they did not use the options provided or social media.

Emergency Situations

Respondents were asked 'Are you aware of what risks affect where you live? This means the emergencies that are most likely to affect you and your property'. Just over half of respondents (54.9%, n=189) said 'no', whilst just under half of respondents (44.5%, n=153) said 'Yes'. If respondents answered Yes, they were asked to list the risks. There were 145 responses added, from which a range of themes were identified, that were separated into several categories:

- Personal emergencies (e.g. hazards for the individual).
- Localised emergencies (e.g. fires, utility loss, road blockage).
- Major, national or international emergency (e.g. war, civil unrest, a rail collision).
- Weather conditions (e.g. flooding, extreme heat or cold, wind, or ice/snow).
- Other topics.

Across all categories, the most frequent themes were 'flooding' (n=89), 'fire or explosions' (n=51), 'loss of utilities' (n=45), 'Extreme weather or storms' (n=32), 'Wind, including trees falling' (n=26), and 'Road network issues, including collisions or blockages' (n=24).

Those that said they were aware of the risks affecting where they live, were then asked, 'Do you have a plan, or have you made preparations in the event of this emergency occurring?'. Of those that responded, 40.4% (n=61) said 'yes', whilst 59.6% (n=90) said 'no'. In the comments, the most frequently occurring themes were 'Having an action plan', 'Equipment – light source, candles and matches', and 'food supplies'.

Lastly, respondents were asked 'If there was an emergency situation in your local area, that could affect you, how would you like to be informed about it?'. The most selected option was 'Text message (Alert) on mobile phone' (n=306), followed by Local TV News updates (n=157), and social media notification on mobile phone/tablet (n=129). The least selected option was 'Local information centre' (n=18), 'Other' (n=22) and 'Other organisations' websites' (n=32).

Background

The Voice of Warwickshire panel (VoW) panel gives residents aged 18 and over in Warwickshire an opportunity to share their views on issues in Warwickshire.

This report summarises the results of the fourteenth survey sent to all Voice of Warwickshire panel members. This survey was intended to gather panel members' views on support in the event of a major emergency or incident. It also asked about current understanding and knowledge about Warwickshire Resilience Forum, and how prepared respondents are for emergencies.

Method

An online survey was hosted on the Citizen Space 'Ask Warwickshire' site via a private link only available to panel members. Panel members were sent an email with a link to participate in the online survey. Two reminder emails were sent to those who had not completed the survey during the live period. In total, an email with a link to the survey was distributed to 910 members of the Voice of Warwickshire panel (this number excludes emails that failed to send to the email address provided).

The survey ran from 29th January 2025 to 23rd February 2025.

Quantitative results have been analysed and open text responses have been themed. Descriptive analysis of quantitative data is presented in figures. Qualitative (open text) data has been analysed using thematic analysis. Themes are presented in tables and a range of example quotations are used to illustrate these themes throughout and to demonstrate a range of views shared. Please note, in some places these quotes are extracts, and in some cases, they may have been amended for obvious spelling and grammatical errors, or to omit information that might identify an individual or organisation. Other than these amendments, all quotes are reported as they were submitted in the survey. Some quotes will have multiple themes attached to them, to ensure all topics raised are captured during analysis.

Appendix 1 provides the survey questions.


Results

There were 344 responses to the survey: a response rate 37.8%.

4.1 Respondent Profile

The below tables show the demographic characteristics of respondents. When looking at representation overall, younger respondents were underrepresented, and older respondents (over the aged of 60) were over-represented proportionally, in comparison to the population over 18 in Warwickshire. There was slightly more diversity in the sexual orientation of respondents, compared to the general population, but there were no respondents who identified with some ethnicities.

Figure 1 and Table 1 show where panel members that responded live. The place of residence of panel members responding to the survey is broadly similar to the distribution of residents aged 18 and over in Warwickshire.





4.2 Warwickshire Resilience Forum (WRF)

How would you describe your level of awareness of what Warwickshire Resilience Forum is?

Respondents were first asked 'How would you describe your level of awareness of what Warwickshire Resilience Forum is?'. Most respondents (68.9%, n=237) were 'not aware at all'. Just under a third of respondents (28.2%, n=97) said they were aware of it but didn't know much about it. A small proportion of respondents (2.9%, n=10) said they had a good level of awareness about it. No respondents said they were actively engaged in it.




Figure 2 - How would you describe your level of awareness of what Warwickshire Resilience Forum is?

The respondents that said they had a good level of awareness of the WRF (n=10) were then asked a follow up question 'How did you hear about Warwickshire Resilience Forum?'. Three respondents heard about WRF from the Website, two from the local council, two from social media, one from a community group, one from friends and one respondent who responded 'other' and 'I've worked in local government in another part of the country.'.

Do you recognise this logo?


Respondents were then asked 'Do you recognise this logo?', with Figure 4 shown as an image.


Figure 5 - Do you recognise this logo?

The majority of respondents (91.3%, n=314) did not recognise the logo (Figure 5). Smaller proportions said they weren't sure (4.4%, n=15), or answered 'Yes' (4.1%, n=14). One respondent did not answer.

The logo shown represents the Warwickshire Resilience Forum, which is a multi-agency partnership of organisations that coordinates the response to emergencies in the county. What does the above logo mean to you? (Please select as many responses as applicable)

Respondents were then provided with a description of the logo and asked, 'What does the above logo mean to you?'. Respondents could select multiple options. Most respondents (82.0%, n=282) selected 'It means nothing to me – it doesn't tell me anything' (Figure 6). Just under a tenth (9.3%, n=32) selected 'I can find out information on how to better prepare for an emergency or incident'. Slightly less (8.1%, n=28) selected 'I can find updates on a current emergency or incident', and less than that (7%, n=24) selected 'I can find out information about the risks to my area'. There were 4.7% (n=16) respondents who said 'other'.

There were 31 comments provided, and five themes were identified within these comments:

- Criticism of Logo (n=12) these comments criticise the logo in some way. Example comments include:
 - "Looks a bit busy and confused. How does it relate to resilience?"
 - "Forum sounds like a group that meet but a closed group and it doesn't inform what the resilience is related to."
 - "You might guess from the name on the logo that it's related to some type of out of the ordinary situation but not necessarily an emergency"
 - "It is just a blob of different colours and does not impart any meaning or information
 as to what the Warwickshire Resilience Forum does or means and is not identifiable
 as anything, let alone any multi -agency authority to provide any assistance in an
 emergency or incident"
 - "The word forum makes it seem more community led rather something the county provides."
 - "Logo strap line is rather woolly. Resilience to what? Economic downturns? Population movement? Etc"
- Description of logo (n=9) comments in this theme described what they see when they look at the logo. For example:
 - "Looks like a group of speech bubbles, suggesting communication"
 - "Apart from the text 'Warwickshire Resilience Forum', which obviously means something, the logo suggests multiple speech bubbles; so, a discussion forum about 'resilience' in Warwickshire."
 - "It looks like a splash of paint or a multicoloured wave coming towards me, with a bird on top."
 - "It looks like a flower /something to do with gardening"
- Not aware of logo, the forum or what it means (n=8) for example:
 - "Apart from its multi-colour format I can't honestly say the logo identifies anything to me"
 - "I genuinely don't know anything about this, hence the logo means nothing to me"
 - "I do not recognise it."
 - "It means absolutely nothing. Has no connection to emergency preparation"

Two comments said they may recognise it in future, two comments said there was no need for change, one comment said they were doing their own research, one comment said the logo wasn't public, and one comment was on an unrelated topic.

Where would you go for information, advice, and guidance in the event of an emergency? (Please select all that apply)

Next, all respondents were asked 'Where would you go for information, advice, and guidance in the event of an emergency?'. Respondents could select as many options as they wanted to. The most selected option (n=233, 67.7%) was 'Emergency services (police, fire, ambulance) website', followed by 'News on the TV' (n=224, 65.1%). The least selected option was Instagram, which was selected by 14 (4.1%) respondents. 'Other social media sites' (n=19, 5.5%), 'Warwickshire Resilience Forum website' (n=21, 6.1%), and 'News feed and channels via X/Twitter' (n=25, 7.3%) were also lesser selected options.




Figure 7 - Where would you go for information, advice, and guidance in the event of an emergency?

In addition, 26 comments were provided, from which some themes can be identified. There were 8 respondents whose comment mentioned looking online (including utility website, news, and internet searches). Four comments were not sure, whilst four comments mentioned social media. Other avenues for information mentioned by one respondent were libraries, WRF, phone emergency alerts, councillor, and neighbourhood watch. Other topics mentioned by one respondent included 'fend for yourself', not having heard of WRF, criticism of the 'Local Council', and previous professional experience.

Do you use websites to access information?




Figure 8 - Do you use websites to access information?

The next question asked, 'Do you use websites to access information?'. The vast majority of respondents said yes (94.2%, n=324), whilst 4.4% (n=15) said no (Figure 8). Five respondents chose not to provide a response.




Figure 9 - Which social media sites or community networking tools do you use?

Respondents were asked 'Which social media sites or community networking tools do you use?', with the option to select multiple responses. The most selected option was 'WhatsApp' (79.7%, n=274), followed by Facebook (68.3%, n=235). Lesser selected options included Snapchat (2.9%, n=10), Warwickshire Connected (6.4%, n=22), and TikTok (6.7%, n=23) (Figure 9).

There were 38 comments provided, from which some themes were identified. There were 15 respondents who said they did not use the options provided or social media. Seven respondents said 'Bluesky', five said Facebook, five mentioned online or websites, four spoke about their community/neighbourhood as an information source and three said Mastodon. Other social media sites named by one respondent included Loops, Mighty Networks, PixelFed, Plenty of Fish, Reddit, Signal, Telegram, and WhatsApp.

Other avenues of information included news (n=2), the council (n=1) and utility company (n=1). Two comments criticised the council.

4.3 Emergency situations

Are you aware of what risks affect where you live? This means the emergencies that are most likely to affect you and your property.

Next respondents were asked 'Are you aware of what risks affect where you live? This means the emergencies that are most likely to affect you and your property'. Just over half of respondents (54.9%, n=189) said 'no', whilst just under half of respondents (44.5%, n=153) said 'Yes' (Figure 10).

If respondents answered Yes, they were asked to list the risks. There were 145 responses added from which a range of themes were identified. These themes were separated into several categories, summarised below and in Table 8.

- Personal emergencies (eg. Hazards for the individual eg trip hazards, burglary)
- Localised emergencies (eg. fires, utility loss, road blockage)
- Major, national or international emergency (for example, war, civil unrest, a rail collision)
- Weather conditions (for example, flooding, extreme heat or cold, wind, or ice/snow)
- Other topics

The five categories above, illustrate the very wide scope of risks and emergencies perceived by respondents. Many of the comments include mentions of several different emergency types, so many of the comments below are extracts. Across all categories, the most frequent themes were 'flooding' (n=89), 'fire or explosions' (n=51), 'loss of utilities' (n=45), 'extreme weather or storms' (n=32), 'wind, including trees falling' (n=26), and 'road network issues, including collisions or blockages' (n=24).



Those that answered, 'yes' to question 8 (n=153), were then asked 'Do you have a plan, or have you made preparations in the event of this emergency occurring?'. There were 151 responses to this question. Of those that responded, 40.4% (n=61) said 'yes', whilst 59.6% (n=90) said 'no' (Figure 11).

There were 59 comments left in the comments box, when asked "If you have answered Yes, please provide any details you would be willing to share, and/or list items you have included in an emergency grab bag.". A range of themes were identified as shown in Table 9.

Other equipment mentioned by 5 or less respondents includes; grab bag (general comment) (n=5), heat source (n=5), first aid (n=5), tools (n=5), clothing (n=4), fire extinguisher (n=4), toiletries (n=4), electric vehicles (n=2), rope (n=2), blankets (n=2), medication (n=2), mobile and chargers (n=2), pets/pet supplies (n=2), radio (n=2), flare (n=1), glasses (n=1), whistles (n=1).

Other topics include council preparation (n=5), burglary prevention (n=3), using skills to support (n=2), improvements to be made (n=2), unclear topic (n=1), remote data storage (n=1), and general property maintenance (n=1).

If there was an emergency situation in your local area, that could affect you, how would you like to be informed about it?

Lastly, respondents were asked 'If there was an emergency situation in your local area, that could affect you, how would you like to be informed about it?'. Respondents could select multiple options. The most selected option was 'Text message (Alert) on mobile phone' (n=306, 89%), followed by 'Local TV news updates' (n=157, 45.6%), and 'social media notification on mobile phone/table (n=129, 37.5%). The least selected option was 'Local information centre' (n=18, 5.2%), 'Other' (n=22, 6.4%) and 'Other organisations' websites' (n=32, 9.3%).




Figure 12 - If there was an emergency situation in your local area, that could affect you, how would you like to be informed about it?

There were 34 qualitative responses provided in the 'other – please specify' comments box. A range of topics were raised in the comments, including:

- Websites official websites such as council, police, as well as general websites (n=9)
 - "Local council website"
 - "Facebook often seems to have more information, more quickly, than official websites but it isn't reliable. I think the mainstream websites need to have more detail and be more up to date."

- "Regarding websites, it would be helpful to know which one would be most useful in the case of emergencies."
- "WCC and NWBC websites we're more likely to go to these initially than a specific resilience forum website"
- "WCC website optimised for search engine results, local media Leamington observer, bbc Coventry and Warwickshire website."
- "Local police or council websites"
- Community Communication (n=5)
 - "Not known. I do not have a mobile phone, do not watch tv or use radio. I use social media sometimes. I assume that if there was an emergency my neighbours would tell me."
 - "Village WhatsApp group"
 - "Local councillors who live in the village."
 - "Community Noticeboard"
 - "Parish council WhatsApp"

Other methods of being informed include email (n=4), loudspeaker (n=3), phone (n=3), social media (n=3), text (n=3), council (n=2), any method (n=1), door knocking (n=1), flood alert system (n=1), letter (n=1), news (n=1), and radio (n=1). Other topics include 'I don't know' (n=3), council criticism (n=2), don't need help (n=1), intention to look at WRF website (n=1), and request for council action (n=1). Two comments were categorised as other.
