Welcome to your Spring Heart of England Community Rail Partnership Newsletter! As a Chair who isn't particularly local to Warwickshire (I'm across the county boundary in Leicestershire running a steam railway!) the variety of activity that we undertake, all of which makes lives better in some way, is a constant delight.

Our Wild Rails Biodiversity Education Programme, delivered with Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, continues to grow. In recent weeks, the Lapworth Bug Hotel has been a particular highlight, attracting both local interest and some positive coverage in the press. It's a good example of how we can use railway settings to support environmental education in practical and engaging ways.

We've also been building on our work with secondary schools around STEM and careers in the rail sector. Recent visit to Alstom at Oxley Depot & Porterbrook's Long Marston Rail Innovation Centre offered students the chance to explore different aspects of the industry. These kinds of experiences are only possible thanks to the commitment of our corporate partners, and they play a valuable role in helping to address the well-documented skills gap.

2025 is, of course, Railway 200 year, and we've been working with Chiltern Railways to help schools book visits to the Exhibition Train, which will be in at Birmingham Moor Street in July. With tickets now on sale, it should be a worthwhile opportunity for everyone to explore how railways have shaped and continue to influence society.

Finally, Heart CRP was invited to attend a Houses of Parliament event as contributors to the Feel Good Field Trip project with Avanti West Coast. It was good to see the work of CRPs recognised in this way, and to hear about other projects making a difference around the country.

Thanks to all those who've contributed to the work highlighted here and more besides—it's very much appreciated and really makes a huge difference.

- Your Railway Future: Uncovering some of the more hidden roles in rail and encouraging people to consider a career in rail to shape the next 200 years





The 200 Journey's project which aspires to take 200 groups of Coventry and Warwickshire school children to visit 200 stations on the UK rail network over the course of 2025 is underway. Wild Rails has engaged with 55 students to date and 2 schools during its pilot year. It's aim is to engage with schools along the railway line from Leamington Spa to Birmingham Moor Street and help students to learn about improving biodiversity at stations.

Spring saw the arrival of a large Bug Hotel at Lapworth Station which was the culmination of many months of work with Lapworth Primary. Not to forget all our fabulous partners including Network rail for the community leased land, EH Smith Builders Merchants



for the generous donation of volunteers and materials, Warwickshire Wildlife Trust for their learning support. Lapworth Station Adopters were also fundamental in preparing the land and sharing our vision. See the making of it in this video!

The community leased land the bug hotel sits on is adjacent to Lapworth station, which meant we could be much more ambitious in our design and installation. See more information under the Sustainability section.


The hope is Wild Rails will strengthen the relationships between Heart CRP, local schools, station adopter groups and the TOCs.



Wild Rails Nature Inspired Art Prints for Stations

As part of the wider Wild Rails biodiversity pilot project we ran a cyanotype art workshop with the Eco-Club at Campion School, in Leamington. The idea was to create some nature inspired art work for their local train station, so there was a lasting legacy to let passengers know about the project. These were the results at various stages of creating the prints, which are being designed into posters for the station (coming soon).


For those curious about the Cyanotype process, it was invented in 1842 by Sir John Herschel and is credited as being the earliest form of basic photography. To create a print you place an object such as a flower, on special light-sensitive paper and expose it to UV rays from the sun. Where the object is laid over the paper a shadow is created.



STEM 5

April was a busy month with two Year 10 STEM trips organised with our wonderful Corporate Partners Porterbrook and Alstom. Porterbrook hosted our at activities at Long Marston Rail Innovation Centre where we got to experience the HydroFLEX train, the first hydrogen-powered train to operate on the UK's network. This was an amazing opportunity for students to see behind the scenes ground breaking technology and talk with engineers, project managers and operational staff, in addition to finding out how apprenticeships and graduates schemes can provide a route into such careers. Alstom hosted at Oxley Depot where activities included a tour of the impressive site and train driver cabs plus an MTa Kit marble run challenge. With staff shortages in the rail industry and engineering posts across many sectors, we hope these trips inspire the next generation to consider this career path, broadening students awareness of local engineering and rail opportunities.




STEM 5

January saw the completion of the STEM activity days with partners the Smallpiece Trust, funded by Cross Country. These interactive sessions help students see the positives of an engineering career and identify opportunities in the Rail industry. These were days well spent designing gear or pulley motorised vehicles and their very own environmentally sustainable train station. Over the 3 years running 739 students have undertaken the Rail Challenge and an impressive 575 of them were awarded the recognised CREST Award! See the work in action click here.



Emily the Engineer Primary STEM Engagement

Network Rail have produced an activity book called Emily the Engineer, aimed at primary school level STEM engagement. Heart CRP will hold a stall at Coventry station in the summer holidays (23.07.25) to hand out to young travellers. The books helps introduces STEM activities in a fun way, perfect for long or short train adventures.



Rail Safety

As part of Heart CRP's continued commitment to rail safety with partners LearnLive, to deliver the Rail Safe Friendly programme in the Midlands, a further 6 new schools have been worked with since Christmas reaching a total of 2,843 new young people. This in addition to the 35 schools already involved on a Bronze or Silver level accreditation, and alongside Heart CRP personally visiting schools, and giving pretrip rail safety lessons.



Westgate Primary in Warwick achieved Gold status last month, and some of their rail safety poster designs have been included on this page. With a new total website views of over 28, 443, we are looking to build on this number each month. William Makes an Appearance Along the Shakespeare Line!

Over 40 station volunteers along the Shakespeare Line between Birmingham Moor Street and Stratford upon Avon supported the installation of life-size William Shakespeare statues at 18 stations! The "Bringing Shakespeare to the Shakespeare Line" project was conceived by the Trustees of the Friends of the Shakespeare Line and included each station adopting their very own Shakespeare Play e.g. Wythall has Macbeth and Henley in Arden has Romeo and Juliet.







With each station adopting its own
Shakespeare play, the volunteers will develop
themes around 'their' play at 'their' station. This
initiative not only brings Shakespeare and
dramatic art into the mainstream but also
serves as a valuable resource for National
Curriculum and English GCSE students,
signposting the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust as
a key educational resource.

The project has effectively brought the route to life, living up to its name of 'The Shakespeare Line' and making the journey to Stratford upon Avon even more exciting for the visitor.
