


South Warwickshire's Climate Change Progress and Plans

Our Journey

- Both Councils declared a Climate Emergency in 2019
- Committed to
 - Becoming a Carbon Neutral Council by 2025
 - As close a possible to a Carbon Neutral District by 2030
- WDC agreed Climate Emergency Action Plan in February 2020 and supported proposals for a Council Tax Referendum to be held in May 2020
- SDC agreed a Climate Change Roadmap in February 2020
- Warwick People's Inquiry October 2020 to February 2021
- Understanding the data Scatter data and organisational carbon baseline

Our Journey

- Joint Climate Change Programme Director April 2021
- Working together: Joint climate change ambitions July 2021
- Joint Climate Change Action Programme November 2021
- Working to build our capacity
 - Political leadership mirrored climate change portfolios
 - Staff resources staff team to provide capacity for major climate projects
 - Budgets each Council has agreed to £500k per year for climate change and seeking to refocus wider budgets to minimise carbon
 - Training and carbon literacy for staff recognising our organisational knowledge is limited we are planning a staff training programme



Our Ambitions

Warwick District Council and Stratford-on-Avon Council have agreed the following shared ambitions.

- Ambition 1 Net Zero Carbon Council by 2025: ensure the new South Warwickshire Council is net zero carbon within a year of its first elections and services provided through contractors include carbon reduction targets to deliver net zero by 2030.
- Ambition 2 Low Carbon South Warwickshire 2030: to reduce net carbon emissions from across South Warwickshire by a minimum of 55% by 2030 and how to further reduce carbon emissions to net zero by 2050.
- Ambition 3 Adaptation 2050: by 2050 to enable our environment and communities to have adapted to the potential of at least a 3 degrees rise in global temperatures by 2100.




Figure 3: SCATTER 2017 inventory for South Warwickshire, shown by sub-sector.






Our Plans: Some Headlines

- Three year Climate Change Action Programme
 - Costed plans to ensure all our housing stock reaches EPC C and then work towards net-zero
 - Improve carbon reduction advice to "able to pay" homeowners
 - Apply LADs, SHDF and Sustainable Warmth Grants (totalling over £10m across South Warwickshire) to retrofit homes
 - Deliver large scale tree planting across South Warwickshire
 - Deliver joint two stage Assets Decarbonisation Plan (stage 1 = quick wins; stage 2 = heating system replacement)
 - Adoption of new Net Zero Buildings Planning Policy in early 2023
 - Develop and deliver a South Warwickshire EV Charging strategy (using our car parks and other estate)
 - Promote the "Better Points" sustainable travel app for Commonwealth Games and beyond

Our Plans: Some Headlines

- Three year Climate Change Action Programme
 - Investment in large scale low carbon energy: Green hydrogen refuelling and solar generation
 - Local Climate Engagement Scheme engaging parish councils and rural communities
 - Accelerate our approach to Climate Change Adaptation
 - Link with the West Midlands Adaptation Plan
 - Working with the Met Office to understand local data, risks and priorities
 - Working in partnership with other organisations and agencies to drive progress in high risk areas
 - Incorporating adaptation in to planning policy (South Warwickshire Local Plan)

The challenges we face

- Working together across local government and with public sector more widely
- Community engagement
- Funding
- Things happen! (e.g. Covid; budget pressures)
- Staying focused maintaining consensus and momentum across different political groups and two sets of politicians
- Organisational capacity (there is so much else going on) and knowledge (training is key)
- Timescales: we have declared an emergency and want to progress at pace
- National policy context
