We work alongside communities and library colleagues in the north of the county, utilise data to inform our programming and are bold in our testing of new approaches to ensure exceptional delivery.







NPO CASE STUDY

Hidden Stories: Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Communities

In 2024, we celebrated and shared Gypsy, Roma, and Traveller (GRT) heritage across Warwickshire through creative workshops, library events, and educational resources. Led by Gemma Lees, the project created inclusive spaces for cultural exchange and learning between GRT and non-GRT communities.

Gemma Lees is a disabled artist of Romani heritage, and daughter of beloved Romani storyteller, Richard O'Neill.

"I was able to both act as a role model to the Traveller children and design a programme of workshops which reflected their cultures back to them in a positive light [...] I feel very honoured to have worked with them." - Gemma Lees




- **70%** new audiences to Warwickshire libraries
- 6 x GRT library sign-ups
- **80%** of participants noted a change in their attitudes

NPO CASE STUDY

Key Activities and Impact

KEY ACTIVITES:

School Engagement

- 6 workshops at Wolvey CofE Primary School
- 24 Year 5 students (6 GRT, 18 non-GRT)
- Activities included: cardboard vardos, black patch gypsy dolls, basket weaving, proggy rugs and polonius ponies.

Library Tour

- Five-location library tour
- 261 participants
- Libraries exhibitions
 with craft stations,
 storytelling tents
 and anonymous
 question boxes for
 GRT cultural queries
- Regular Q&A sessions fostering community dialogue

Additional Programming

- Field trip to

CULTURAL IMPACT:

- **80%** of children learnt new information about local GRT history
- 95% felt the project effectively celebrated GRT History Month
- 70% discovered new library services

The project's significance extended beyond local impact, earning feature coverage in Traveller's Times magazine, reaching national audiences within the GRT community.
