This includes children aged 0–18 across all education settings who are subject to: Section 17 — Child in Need (CiN) - Allocated a social worker Section 47 — Child Protection (CP) - Allocated a social worker because they are at risk of significant harm Ever-6 CWSW - Children who have had a social worker within the last six years	Children not previously in care Children who have not been in the care of a local authority and live with someone other than their birth parent(s). This is usually a family member or close family friend. Warwickshire VS supports children with formal legal orders: - Special Guardianship Order (SGO) - Child Arrangements Order (CAO) - Adoption Order Warwickshire VS does not provide advice for: - Informal kinship care - Private fostering

The Designated Teacher has statutory responsibility for promoting educational achievement. Warwickshire Virtual School monitors education and provides advice to social workers and designated teachers for each child aged 2–18. Education settings should include these pupils in their Census return. Eligible early years settings may receive Early Years Pupil Premium, paid directly to the setting. A termly electronic Personal Education Plan (ePEP) is required via welfarecall.com. Schools can request Pupil Premium Plus through the PEP.	The Designated Teacher has statutory responsibility for promoting educational achievement. Warwickshire Virtual School provides information and advice to settings, parents/carers and professionals to support improved educational outcomes for children aged 2–18 who attend a Warwickshire education setting. Education settings should include these pupils in their Census return. Eligible children may attract Early Years Pupil Premium or Pupil Premium Plus, which is paid directly to settings. An education plan is advised.	A DSL or nominated senior leader should oversee this cohort. Warwickshire Virtual School provides strategic advice and support to education and social care colleagues for children aged 0–18 who attend Warwickshire settings. There is no individual funding attached to this cohort. Schools should record pupils with open CIN or CP plans on their Management Information System. CIN and CP plans should include attendance and/or education targets. Support should be considered through Pupil Premium, where eligible, and wider inclusion planning.	A DSL or nominated senior leader should oversee this cohort. Warwickshire Virtual School provides strategic advice on this cohort. Kinship carers and schools/settings may access individual advice where appropriate and with consent. Funding may be available to families through the Kinship Carers Support Fund. A written plan, such as Early Support, is advised where there are educational or attendance concerns.
