#### COLESHILL MANOR CARDEN

As part of the recent HS2 construction, archaeologists uncovered a garden at Coleshill Manor they described as being one of the largest and most important Elizabethan gardens in the country. Larger than the gardens of Hampton Court and Kenilworth Castle, it is thought that Sir Robert Digby, who lived at the manor, may have created the gardens in the hope of a royal visit from Queen Elizabeth I due to her frequent visits to Kenilworth Castle nearby.
