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## Introduction

National Careers Week (NCW) is a celebration of careers guidance and free resources in education across the UK. The aim is to provide a focus for careers guidance activity at an important stage in the academic calendar to help support young people leaving education.

## What is a career?

#### "An occupation undertaken for a significant period of a person's life and with opportunities for progress"

A job is "a paid position of regular employment"

The difference between the two is often seen as a job being a means to an end – the purpose is to go to work and get money. A career is seen as being more of a choice, usually a profession or sector you have chosen to go into.

## Choosing the career for you - Sectors

A sector, also known as an industry, is a group of companies that are grouped together due to their similar primary business activities.

## Choosing the career for you – Identifying your skills

When beginning your search into what career you might want to go into, it's important to look at your skills. Everyone has their individual skills and identifying them can be the first step to finding your career path.

In order to identify your skills is may be useful to look at technical and general skills, your hobbies and interests and what you are good at. If you're struggling to think of skills talk to your family, teacher and friends and ask them what your skills are and what they think you're good at.







Once you have a list of skills you can look at what careers could fit those skills. The 'useful links' can help with this.

## Apprenticeships

## What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a real job where you learn, gain experience and get paid. You're an employee with a contract of employment and holiday leave. By the end of an apprenticeship, you'll have the right skills and knowledge needed for your chosen career.

It can take between one to six years to complete an apprenticeship depending on which one you choose, what level it is and your previous experience. It's funded from contributions made by the Government and your employer.

## Levels of an apprenticeship

Each apprenticeship has a level and an equivalent education level. You can start an apprenticeship at any level.

Depending on the level, some apprenticeships may:

- require previous qualifications such as an English or maths GCSE
- give extra training in the English or maths skills needed so you're at the right level

At the end of your apprenticeship, you'll achieve the equivalent education level. For example, if you complete a level 3 apprenticeship, you'll achieve the equivalent of an A level.

	Level	Equivalent education level
Intermediate	2	GCSE
Advanced	3	A level
Higher	4,5,6 and 7	Foundation degree and above
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or master's degree







## What you'll earn

What you earn will depend on the industry, location and type of apprenticeship you choose.

If you're aged 16 to 18 or in the first year of your apprenticeship, you're entitled to the apprentice rate.

If you're 19 or over and have completed the first year of your apprenticeship, you're entitled to the <u>National</u> <u>Minimum Wage</u>.

This is the minimum you'll earn - many employers pay a lot more and offer their apprentices a competitive salary.
