

How are we are supporting the Autism strategy?

Coventry and Warwickshire Joint Autism Strategy – 5 priority workstreams

Priority 1- supporting people with communication, sensory and emotional needs to help themselves pre and post assessment

- Dimensions review for neurodivergent individuals, and their families.
- Improving information and advice
- Reviewed FAQs
- The new Community Autism Support Service (CASS)

Priority 2 – Reducing inequalities

- Project looking at improved access and adapted services/support
- Emotionally Based School Avoidance project in Warwickshire

Priority 3- Develop a range of organisations locally with the skills to support autistic people

 Improving health and social care workforce development opportunities, including roll out of the Oliver McGowan training.

Priority 5 – Co production

- 'Working Together Charter' WPCV & IMPACT involved at all levels
- Autistic Adults through Grapevine or not members of the two groups?













Priority 4 – Develop the all age autism specialist support offer

Redesign diagnostic pathway to reduce length of wait

- Working with external partners to mobilise additional assessment capacity
- Build capacity and capability across the system for diagnosis
- Differentiated diagnosis project with Education Psychologists and Specialist Teachers. Extending to paediatrics and RISE

Clarify responsibilities across the system for autistic people including support at key transition points

 System wide workshops, working with EBEs and parent carers regarding expectations and system offer to highlight success, barriers and gaps

Ensure autistic people can access and receive appropriately adapted services

- CWPT Neurodiversity Clinical Offer trust wide vision
- Publication of the 4 p's framework (see slide 11) and the Reasonable Adjustment toolkit for mental health to be amended for children's services
- · Children's services self assessment regarding access and adjustment required- trust wide plan
- Autism Modules for RISE staff-target 95% by October

Ensure services are meeting the need as part of a specialist offer

- Specialist Neurodevelopmental service offer scoping
- Complex Case Panel Pilot- consultation, joint working, individual work focusing on neurodivergent profile (Multidisciplinary & multi agency)













Story 1: "I'm really anxious, do I have autism?"

Currently in Coventry & Warwickshire Partnership Trust

...I am a child who is looked after & have been referred into mental health services as I am really anxious. My referral also questions if I am Autistic. I have been told I will need to go to two different services for both things...

With the neurodiversity clinical offer in Coventry & Warwickshire Partnership Trust

...I am a child who is looked after, has anxiety & may also be Autistic. My anxiety is the main problem for me at the moment. My mental health worker has suggested that they see me with a Neurodevelopmental clinician to do a joint assessment for both my anxiety & the autism as they have only just met me...













Story 2: "I'm autistic but I'm not mentally ill"

Currently in Coventry & Warwickshire Partnership Trust

...I am an Autistic young person who is struggling & I am at crisis point. I have been told that I do not have a mental health need so I have no service to go to for support...

With the neurodiversity clinical offer in Coventry & Warwickshire Partnership Trust

...I am an Autistic young person who is struggling & I am at crisis point. I don't have a mental health need so instead I am going to be seen by the specialist Neurodevelopmental community team ...

Joint Working Criteria: Main need difficult to distinguish between impact of Neurodiversity & Mental Health

Top Ten Achievements over the past year...

- 1. Delivered 4120 Autism Assessments, against a plan of 3251
- 2. Reduced overall waiting times from 5 years down to less than a year
- 3. Removed 4400 from the backlog of the waiting list
- 4. Contacting people currently waiting 48 weeks to make an appointment to be assessed
- 5. Mobilised 9 different external providers to deliver the above, all with different access criteria
- 6. Delivered 3 system-wide workshops on the Autism Strategy
- 7. Reviewed the Green Light Toolkit with Community Paediatrics and RISE
- 8. Co-developed with Experts by Experience (EBEs) a DNA & Closure policy
- 9. Completed the Differential Diagnosis England Project
- 10. Developed the 4 P's and Reasonable Adjustment Toolkit

ADHD

- Increase in autism assessments has increased demand for ADHD assessments-no additional investment currently
- ADHD pathway has been reviewed and business case being prepared with commissioner involvement
- Plan to co produce ADHD FAQs to help guide families regarding private assessments
- Locally plan to merge Autism and ADHD pathways if/when funded to ensure assessment for both.

Community Autism Support Service

- The new Community Autism Support Service launched on 1st April as a collaborative partnership between Autism West Midlands, Act for Autism and Coventry and Warwickshire Mind
- Residents in Coventry and Warwickshire who may self-identify as autistic, those awaiting an autism assessment and those with an autism diagnosis will have more choice in the emotional and practical support they are able to access.
- The service will also be **easier to access using a single 'front door' approach**. This will mean that access to this **all-age service** will be through a single phone number and dedicated website.

Aims of the service

- Improve the communities **understanding of autism** and help those who are autistic to understand themselves and to be able to celebrate their differences.
- Support people to manage and thrive at home, in education, in employment and in the community.
- Help individuals understand their own communication and interaction styles and their sensory preferences.
- Help improve people's self-esteem and confidence, manage relationships and enjoy day-to-day life.
- Support autistic individuals with managing symptoms of low to moderate emotional wellbeing and mental health difficulties.
- Provide an environment where all aspects of autism are recognised, accepted and respected.
- Offer parent, family and carer support through peer activities.
- Provide resources and signpost to other community-based support, as appropriate.
- Give particular transition support for young people, age 18-25 years.













Service offer

- 1. Navigation / front door all age
- 2. Community Outreach service all age an experienced Coventry and Warwickshire-based team, working with individuals to identify goals and provide group, one-to-one and themed support for children, young people and adults.
- 3. Peer mentoring service all age available in the coming months, this new element of CASS aims to connect autistic people with trained peer mentors, with their own lived-experience, helping to support with daily routines, confidence building, and wellbeing support, exploring opportunities to engage in local activities and community groups.
- **4. Training and education** Workshops, toolbox sessions and recorded materials help build confidence and improve understanding of autism. Drawing on lived-experience, all sessions and courses provide effective and practical support for day-to-day living, in the community, in school, and in the workplace.
 - Day-long courses for professionals
 - 4x 3hr course for parents and carers
 - 2.5hr workshops for parents, carers and professionals
 - 1hr toolbox sessions for parents and carers
 - Webinars and professional toolbox sessions coming soon
 - Understanding your autism groups children and adult
