## Statement of Evidence for Path Claim RAP 9

- The path is shown on the Rugby Board of Health Map 1851 (original now held by the Warwickshire County Record Office at TD 07/14, with a copy at Z731(U)) where it is coloured yellow in the same way as the other linking paths and all other paths and footways in the area. The reference table on this map shows that this colour means the route has a 'Macadam or Ballast' surface, which suggests that it was maintained by a public body, such as the Highway Authority.
- 2 It is shown on the first edition of the Ordnance Survey six inch map (1887) and on all subsequent maps.
- 3 A site visit shows that the path, with RAP 10 and RAP 11, is called 'Church Walk'. It has a well maintained tarmac surface, with street lighting, and the boundary walls give no indication of any previous walls, gates or other possible barriers across the path, other than bollards at the street end. The path is in heavy, daily, use as a footpath.
- 4 It is considered, therefore, that it is reasonable to allege that the path subsists as a public footpath and should be recorded as such on the Definitive Map.
