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## Statement of Evidence for Path Claim RAP 12

The section in Rugby appears to be the first bridle road created by the Rugby Inclosure Award 1774 (held by Warwickshire County Record Office at QS75/93), with a width of 24 feet. It was described as going 'from Bilton at Clift Gate ...... to the road first described at Bagshawes Water Mill'.

The part in Bilton (with the continuation recorded as part of RB4 and RB5 on the Definitive Map) is shown on the map with the Bilton Tithe Apportionment

1840. (WCRO: CR564/34.)

The path is shown on the deposited plans for the Tamworth and Rugby Railway 1844 (WCRO: QS111/143). The Book of Reference describes parcel 3a (Rugby) as 'Public Footroad', with the owner being the Surveyor of Highways, and parcel 5a (Rugby) as 'Public Highway', with the owner being the Surveyor of Highways. [N.B. The main road is also described as 'Public Highway'.]

The path is also shown on the deposited plans for the Rugby, Derby and Manchester Railway 1845 (WCRO: QS111/172). [N.B. The Book of

Reference could not be found.]

The path is also shown, with the continuation into Bilton parish, on the deposited plans for the Rugby, Learnington and Warwick Railway 1845 (WCRO: QS111/174) where it is labelled as "Bridle Road". The Book of Reference describes parcel 6 (Rugby) as 'grass, brook and Bridle Road', with parcel 5 as 'grass, hovel, brook and bridle road', with the owners including the Surveyor of Highways in both cases. In Bilton, parcel 2 is described as 'grass [etc], Bridle Road and footpath', parcel 3 as 'grass, Bridle Road and footpath', and parcel 5 as 'grass [etc] and Bridle Road', the owners, in each case, including the Surveyors of Highways.


The path is shown on the first edition of the Ordnance Survey six inch map

(1887), and on all subsequent maps.

7 It is now used as an access road along the north side of the railway, with a

vehicle access under the railway, and no barriers.

It is considered, therefore, that it is reasonable to allege that the route subsists as a public bridleway and should be recorded as such on the Definitive Map.
