What is a Parent Carer's needs assessment?

It's an assessment for carers under Section 17 ZD of the Children Act 1989 who;

- live in Warwickshire;
- are 18 years or over;
- provides or intends to provide care for a disabled child
- has parental responsibility.

What does the law say?

Under s.17ZD Children Act 1989;

- (1) A local authority in England must, if the conditions in subsections (3) and (4) are met, assess whether a parent carer within their area has needs for support and, if so, what those needs are.
- (2) In this Part "parent carer" means a person aged 18 or over who provides or intends to provide care for a disabled child for whom the person has parental responsibility.
- (3) The first condition is that—

(a) it appears to the authority that the parent carer may have needs for support, or(b) the authority receive a request from the parent carer to assess the parent carer's needs for support.

- (4) The second condition is that the local authority are satisfied that the disabled child cared for and the disabled child's family are persons for whom they may provide or arrange for the provision of services under section 17.
- (5) An assessment under subsection (1) is referred to in this Part as a "parent carer's needs assessment".
- (6) Subsection (1) does not apply in relation to a parent carer if the local authority have previously carried out a care-related assessment of the parent carer in relation to the same disabled child cared for.
- (7) But subsection (1) does apply (and so a parent carer's needs assessment must be carried out) if it appears to the authority that the needs or circumstances of the parent carer or the disabled child cared for have changed since the last care-related assessment.
- (8) "Care-related assessment" means—
 - (a) a parent carer's needs assessment;
 - (b) an assessment under any of the following-
 - (i) section 1 of the Carers (Recognition and Services) Act 1995;
 - (ii) section 6 of the Carers and Disabled Children Act 2000;
 - (iii) section 4(3) of the Community Care (Delayed Discharges) Act 2003.

- (9) A parent carer's needs assessment must include an assessment of whether it is appropriate for the parent carer to provide, or continue to provide, care for the disabled child, in the light of the parent carer's needs for support, other needs and wishes.
- (10) A local authority in carrying out a parent carer's needs assessment must have regard to—

(a) the well-being of the parent carer, and

(b) the need to safeguard and promote the welfare of the disabled child cared for and any other child for whom the parent carer has parental responsibility.

- (11) In subsection (10) "well-being" has the same meaning as in Part 1 of the Care Act 2014.
- (12) A local authority, in carrying out a parent carer's needs assessment, must involve—
 - (a) the parent carer,
 - (b) any child for whom the parent carer has parental responsibility, and
 - (c) any person who the parent carer requests the authority to involve.
- (13) A local authority that have carried out a parent carer's needs assessment must give a written record of the assessment to—
 - (a) the parent carer, and

(b) any person to whom the parent carer requests the authority to give a copy. must, if the conditions in (a) and (b) below are met, assess whether a parent carer within their area has needs for support and, if so, what those needs are;

- i. The first condition is that it appears to the authority that the parent carer may have needs for support, or the authority receive a request from the parent carer to assess the parent carer's needs for support.
- ii. The second condition is that the local authority are satisfied that the disabled child cared for and the disabled child's family are persons for whom they may provide or arrange for the provision of services under s.17 of the Children Act 1989.

For the purposes of Section 17 a child is disabled if he is blind, deaf or dumb or suffers from mental disorder of any kind or is substantially and permanently handicapped by illness, injury or congenital deformity or such other disability as may be prescribed;

- "development" means physical, intellectual, emotional, social or behavioural development; and
- "health" means physical or mental health.

A parent carer's needs assessment must include an assessment of whether it is appropriate for the parent carer to provide, or continue to provide, care for the disabled child, in the light of the parent carer's needs for support, other needs and wishes. A local authority in carrying out a parent carer's needs assessment must have regard to;

- a) the well-being of the parent carer, and
- b) the need to safeguard and promote the welfare of the disabled child cared for and any other child for whom the parent carer has parental responsibility.

For the purposes of the Children Act 1989 "well-being" has the same meaning as in Part 1 of the Care Act 2014;

Promoting individual well-being¹

- 1) The general duty of a local authority, in exercising a function under this Part in the case of an individual, is to promote that individual's well-being.
- 2) "Well-being", in relation to an individual, means that individual's well-being so far as relating to any of the following;
 - a) personal dignity (including treatment of the individual with respect);
 - b) physical and mental health and emotional well-being;
 - c) protection from abuse and neglect;
 - d) control by the individual over day-to-day life (including over care and support, or support, provided to the individual and the way in which it is provided);
 - e) participation in work, education, training or recreation;
 - f) social and economic well-being;
 - g) domestic, family and personal relationships;
 - h) suitability of living accommodation;
 - i) the individual's contribution to society.
- 3) In exercising a function under this Part in the case of an individual, a local authority must have regard to the following matters in particular;
 - a) the importance of beginning with the assumption that the individual is best-placed to judge the individual's well-being;
 - b) the individual's views, wishes, feelings and beliefs;
 - c) the importance of preventing or delaying the development of needs for care and support or needs for support and the importance of reducing needs of either kind that already exist;
 - d) the need to ensure that decisions about the individual are made having regard to all the individual's circumstances (and are not based only on the individual's age or appearance or any condition of the individual's or aspect of the individual's behaviour which might lead others to make unjustified assumptions about the individual's wellbeing);
 - e) the importance of the individual participating as fully as possible in decisions relating to the exercise of the function concerned and being provided with the information and support necessary to enable the individual to participate;
 - f) the importance of achieving a balance between the individual's wellbeing and that of any friends or relatives who are involved in caring for the individual;
 - g) the need to protect people from abuse and neglect;
 - h) the need to ensure that any restriction on the individual's rights or freedom of action that is involved in the exercise of the function is kept to the minimum necessary for

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achieving the purpose for which the function is being exercised. Assessing Non Parent Carers

Non parent carers (i.e. those without Parental Responsibility) of disabled children will be assessed under the following legislation;

- Young carers (where the carer is themselves under 18 years) of disabled children will be assessed under section 17ZA Children Act 1989
- Adult non-parent carers (aged over 18) of disabled children would be assessed under section 1 Carers Recognition and Services Act 1995, they must request an assessment. Non parent carers would include grandparents, aunts. uncles and any other adult without parental responsibility looking after a disabled child.

What is it for?

Warwickshire are committed to understanding the needs of parent carers. By completing this assessment you will have the chance to tell us how your caring role affects your life and wellbeing. This will help us to assess your needs separately from the child or young person you care for. We will ask you questions which relate to areas of your life that may be affected by your caring role.

How is the assessment completed?

Your assessment will be completed with the support of a Social Worker or Family Support Worker at your assessment meeting, the date of this meeting is stated on page 1. *Care will be taken during the assessment to ensure needs of the child or young person you are caring for are assessed separately from your needs as a carer.*

The questions within the assessment do not specifically ask how a carer's health may be affected via their caring role, when completing the impact statement after each outcome question please consider, if appropriate how your health is affected and provide evidence for this.

Numbers of Assessments

Normally only one assessment of the primary carer will be carried out; where care of the disabled child is shared between parent carers in different settings assessments of both parent carers will be undertaken, Where there is more than one disabled child being cared for this will be taken in to account within the assessment and may result in an additional carer support package.

What happens after your assessment has been agreed?

Once we have carried out your assessment we will use s 17ZF Children Act 1989 to consider and decide the following;

- a) whether the parent carer has needs for support in relation to the care which he or she provides or intends to provide;
- b) whether the disabled child cared for has needs for support;
- c) if paragraph (a) or (b) applies, whether those needs could be satisfied (wholly or partly) by services which the authority may provide under section 17; and
- d) if they could be so satisfied, whether or not to provide any such services in relation to the

parent carer or the disabled child cared for." What happens next?

If we agree that you have needs that should be met by the Local Authority under s17ZD and s 17ZF Children Act 1989 we will agree a care package to support you. In most cases this will be in the form of a direct payment. **Please note:** you will not be able to use a parent carer direct payment to support the care needs of the disabled child or young person you are caring for, their needs should be met via their own assessment of need. If you feel their needs are not being met by their care package please contact your Social Worker to discuss whether a review should take place.

What is a direct payment?

A direct payment is the amount of money that a council agrees needs to be spent in order for a person to have care and support to meet their needs.

How do we decide how much money I can have?

Any decisions regarding a direct payment will be made in line with the Children Act 1989, the Children and Families Act 2014 and Warwickshire County Council's policies and procedures.

We will give you an idea of how much direct payment you may receive, and your Social Worker or Family Support Worker will arrange to visit you to complete a support plan.

During this visit you will have the chance to tell us how you would like to use your direct payment to help you in the areas of your life where you have identified you need support.

A direct payment is an annual allocation and the amount of budget you are offered may be subject to change at a point when your needs are reviewed.

How can your Direct Payment be used?

In principle a direct payment can be used for any expenditure that meets outcomes defined in the agreed support plan as long as expenditure is lawful, effective and affordable.

- Lawful: The expenditure identified as part of the support plan is legitimate and does not contravene any national guidance on how funds can be used.
- Effective: the proposals in the support plan relate to the agreed outcomes which will meet the assessed eligible needs
- Affordable: the total planned expenditure identified can be met within the personal budget.

The budget can be used for a wide range of activities that support the outcomes in the carers support plan as approved by the Council.

Allowed Contingency Funds

Carers with direct payments have the ability to plan for savings across their budgets to enable them to cope with unexpected changes and minor emergencies. The contingency may be between 10-15% of the total annual value of the direct payment. Carers will be able to carry over up to this specified value in their direct payment bank account before the Council would consider recovering funds.

What a Direct Payment cannot be spent on

- Anything that is illegal or is illegal to purchase, or that would endanger a child or young person or any other person;
- Gambling;
- Debt repayment;
- Alcohol;
- Tobacco;
- Clothing;

What if I'm not entitled to a direct payment?

If your needs are assessed but you are not offered a direct payment, there are other ways in which you can be supported as a carer. We will discuss these with you once the assessment has been completed.
