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Statement of Evidence for Southam Claim No. 7a

- The south end of this path is first recorded on a deposited railway plan of 1844 (County Record Office ref. QS111/147) where it is labelled on the plan as "Footway from Bishops Itchington". This village lies to the north of the claimed route and, therefore, confirms the existence of the whole route.
- The deposited railway plan of 1845 (QS111/180) lists the path as being part of entry 58 in Burton Dassett. The Book of Reference lists this as "Grass + Footway", with the owners being given as J. Sabin and the Surveyor of Highways. This shows that the path was considered to be a public highway.
- 3) The deposited railway plan of 1862 (QS111/249) lists the path as part of entry 11 in Burton Dassett. The Book of Reference describes the entry as "Pasture Field and Public Footpaths" with the owners being J. Sabin and the Surveyor of Highways.
- 4) A 4th deposited railway plan, of 1863 (QS111/262), again lists the path as part of the 11th entry in Burton Dassett. The Book of Reference also gives the same description as the 1862 plan and the owners, again, as J. Sabin and the Surveyor of Highways.
- 5) The only estate map, of 1855, is from an Estate Agents Catalogue (EAC 130), but does not show any paths.
- 6) The Ordnance Survey maps, including the first edition of the 6 inch to a mile map of 1885, shows the whole route claimed.
- 7) The submissions made under the 1910 Finance Act show that there were 5 landholdings (including the railway) affected by this path, the entries (from the south) being numbers 14, 198, 95 and 142. These all included allowances for public paths in the Field Books. The entry for the railway (no. 49), however, included no such claim. The relevant figures were:- Hereditament 14: £30, 198: £20, 95: £120, and 142: £10. These are generally consistent with the length of path across the holdings as No. 142 is the shortest, and No. 95 has two path across it, the other being much longer (see our SMClaim7b).
- 8) It is considered that the number of Deposited Railway Plans which, consistently, record the existence of this path over a period of nearly twenty years is sufficient to reasonably allege that this is a public path. It is further considered that this, with the 1910 Finance Act evidence, clearly confirms that it was accepted as being public by all the landowners over a long period while the evidence of the Ordnance Survey maps establishes that the route has not changed for well over a century.
