#### **Documentary Evidence**

N.B. All references are to documents held at the County Record Office.

 The route is described in a deed relating to 30 West Street (CR1886/5812), dated 1679, as "lane to ground called the Fryers" (The land to the rear was the site of the Friary)
 The original route is shown, in its entirety, on the Estate Map of 1788 (CR1886/M24a + M24) as going from West Street (Point A on attached map) north west to Friars Street (Point C).

3) The whole of the original route is shown on the map forming part of the Quarter Sessions Diversion Order made on 13/1/1803 (following a special sessions of 16/101802). (Order Book at CR1618/W7/65, with the Order at CR237/89/3+4) It was described as being a "footway" from West Street to Fryers Lane. The section diverted was 250 feet long from Point B to Point C, with the new, certified, route being from B to D. This part was described as being 1325 feet long and 8 feet wide.

4) This diverted route (B-D) is shown on an (undated) estate map of the property of W.Crompton esq. (CR237/89/1), with its continuation towards Point A.

5) The town map of 1831-40 (CR1618/W6/23) shows the whole path, with a court to the east labelled as Chapel Court.

6) The Tithe Apportionment Map 1848 (CR569/252) shows the route, in the same way as all the other highways/roads, through the built up area.

7) The large scale Board of Health Map of 1851 shows the whole route, in detail, with the northern part labelled as "Friars Court". (Published as part of a teaching package.)

8) The whole route is shown on all subsequent large scale Ordnance Survey maps, with the 1/1250 scale map of 1952 labelling the northern part (including B-D) as "Friars Court".

9) The section B-D was closed by an Extinguishment Order of 1973, due to the redevelopment of the area by Warwick Borough Council. (The route B-E already existed due to the prior redevelopment of that part, by the Council, under the provisions of the Housing Act, by reason of which the path automatically became public as soon as it had been completed.)

#### Other evidence

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1) The whole route A-B-E is shown as adopted/maintainable by the Highway Authority (record maps held by Warwick District Council Engineers).

2) The whole route is well used by the public.

3) There is an official street name plate ("Abbots Way") and street light off Friars Street.
4) The route is surfaced with on-edge blocks under the archway off West Street, then with brick paviors in the passage way. There are standard Highway Authority paving slabs around the top of Monks Way, with the section to Friars Street being surfaced with tarmac. All of these materials are consistent with the materials expected for a public highway at different dates over the last few centuries.

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
