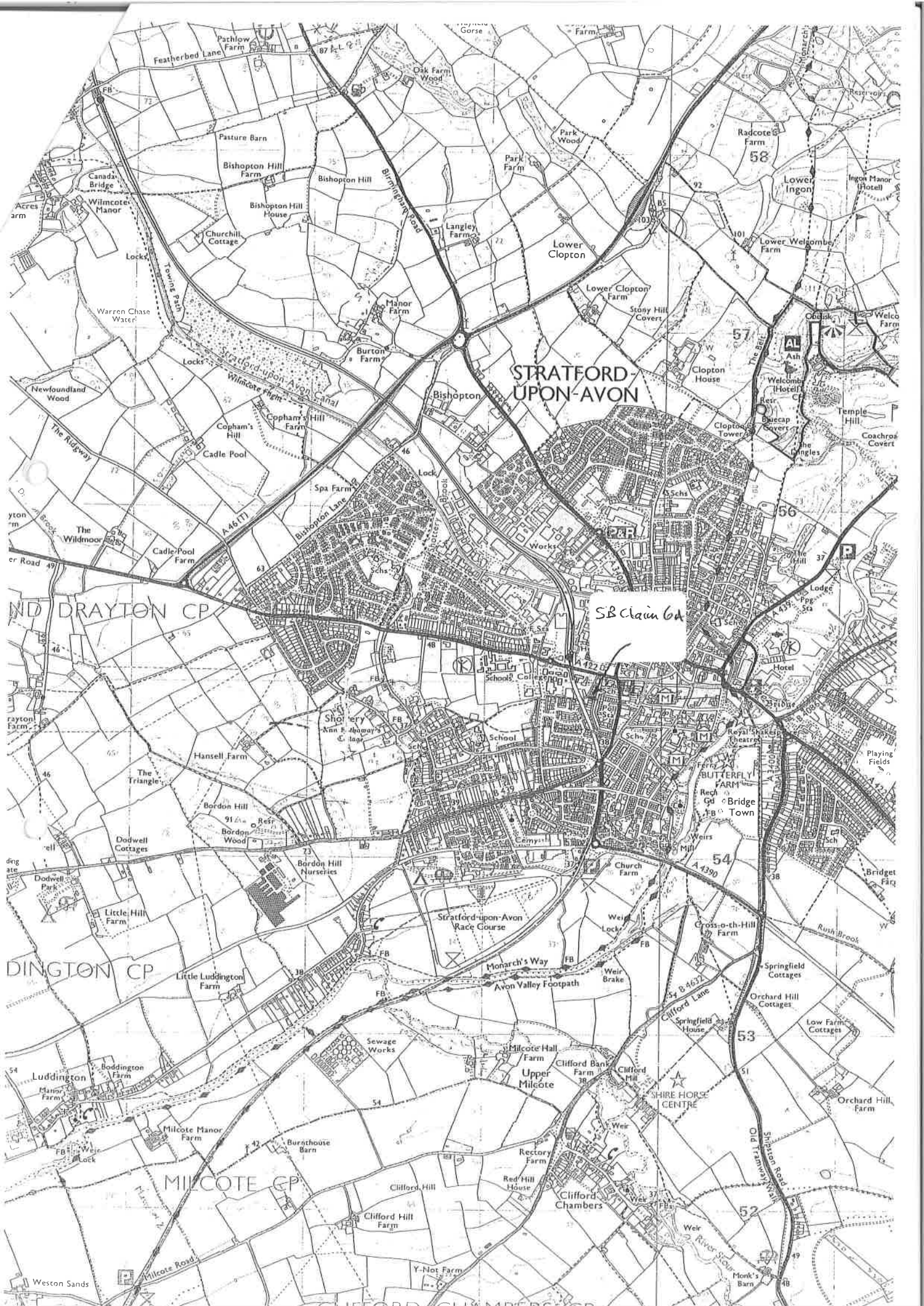

Statement of Evidence for S B Claim 6A

- 1 This path was laid out with the construction of the housing estate following the diversion of SBClaim6 onto its present route. This can be seen from the physical evidence of the original brick boundary walls at the junction of the two paths, where the brickwork is continuous.
- 2 The path is shown as an enclosed route on the first edition of the Ordnance Survey six inch map (1886).
- 3 The path has a good, tarmac, surface which is continuous with the surface of SBClaim6, and there is a modern street light half way along it.
- 4 It is considered, therefore, that it is reasonable to allege that the route subsists as a public footpath and should be recorded as such on the Definitive Map.
