#### Statement of Evidence for Southam Claim No. 7b

- 1) This path was created by the Burton Dassett (Northend and Knightcote) Inclosure Award 1772 (County Record Office ref. QS75/44) in which it is the 13<sup>th</sup> awarded footpath. This is described as a footpath from the Westend of Knightcote Town Street over the allotments to Sir Robert Ladbrooke and George Grenville to the stile into Gaydon at the bottom of the furlong called Hens Nest. These allotments can be identified by reconstructing the map of the Award. The second allotment to George Grenville, as improprietor of part of the tythes, also refers, when describing the responsibilities for fencing the allotments, to the east boundary as lying "across the footway from Knightcote to Geydon". The allotment to Sir Robert Ladbroke, in describing the fences, also refers to the "footpath leading to Geydon". A copy of the reconstruction map has been deposited at the County Record Office and shows the majority of the path being on Sir Robert Ladbrokes allotment and the west part on George Grenvilles allotment.
- 2) The continuation of the path to the west, in Gaydon parish, was created by the Gaydon Inclosure Award of 1759 (QS75/61), in which it is the second awarded footway. It is described as going "From the Comon Town Street near Geydon Inn through the allotment to Thomas Burden in the track it now goes to the stile at Knightcote Hedge near Bolland Gate is the footway leading from Geydon towards Knightcote". The width of the path is given as to be 4 feet. The line of this path must be the, now extinguished, line of SM119a since the parish boundary crossing point is fixed, as the Inclosure Awards are of different dates.
- 3) The deposited railway plan of 1845 (QS111/178) lists the claimed path as part of entries No. 34 and 35 in Burton Dassett. The Book of Reference describes No. 34 as being "Grass and Footway", with the owners being Lord William de Broke and the Surveyor of Highways. The 35<sup>th</sup> entry is described as being "Arable and Footway", with the owners being given as H. T. Hope and the Surveyor of Highways. This reference to the Surveyor of Highways shows that the path was considered to be a public highway while the plan confirms the actual route of it.
- 4) The whole route, including SM1191, is shown the large scale Ordnance Survey maps, including the first edition of the 6 inch to a mile map of 1886, although more recent editions omit the west end.
- 5) There are two hereditaments identified in the returns under the 1910 Finance Act, namely Nos. 95 and 201. The Field Book shows that deductions for public paths were claimed in both cases, that for No. 95 being £120 and that for No. 201 being £10. These figures are generally consistent with the length of path across them, No. 95 having two paths across it, this being the longest. (See our SMClaim 7a for the other path.)



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
