What frontline staff tell us.....



No.1 Priority

Integration to improve partnership, communication and information sharing

Increase parenting education, groups and networks, and start them early (antenatal)

Improve access and quality of mental health support

Increase provision and access to Family Support Workers





All Together Better

"There's less resource and we need to co-work better." (Children's Centre)

"We spend far too much time making arrangements on how we can work together." *(Children's Centre)* "We need more joint working, as no one service is going to make the difference to children and families." *(health)*





Pressure of targets

"FSWs need flexibility to fulfil their roles better - take out targets and that related pressure, so they can do this." (FSW manager)

"We are **constantly bogged down** with our KPIs....children centres have their own target pressures too." (Health Visitor & Children Centre manager)

Mental health

"Children who are most needy in our nursery have mothers with a history of poorer mental health, it's a common thread. It often shows as behaviour and learning development issues." (Nursery)

"I'd say 8 out of 10 children we have in school with social, emotional and mental health problems have mothers that have had mental health problems... Lots of them have suffered post-natal depression and problems bonding with their child." (Primary School Head)

"IDS funds have been cut back....Some families will not get a look in now." (Nurture nursery)

"They say you can't **Transition** diagnose (ASD) that ear, and it should be left till school age: "school will deal with it". But that's not an answer. You end up with a child who disrupts and is unhappy in school." (PVI)

"We've lost a lot of our Child Development Service (CDS). There's a Athway for child with ASD but for global delay... we don't have that pathway anymore." (HV)

"If they don't have autism, or fit the criteria of a special nursery, there's a gap then." (HV)
